For safeguarding purposes, it is also essential that if your child is due to be collected by an adult unknown to the teacher, or if the usual arrangements change, we ask that you let us know in the morning or by letting the Office know before the end of the day. LEARN TO RIDE COURSE

TfGM in partnership with BikeRight! will be running FREE children's cycling courses at various venues across Greater Manchester From 16th September 2023 until the end of March 2024.

The Learn to Ride course is aimed at primary school children (minimum age 6 years old) and aims to give them a good start on their cycling journey. They will need their own bike (with no stabilisers) and helmet. If you don't have your own bike, they may have a small selection to borrow (Please check details on each event). The sessions are in a small groups with two experienced Bikeability instructors. You can sign up for more than one session if you wish.

Important - Parents/carers must stay for the whole session. The training will go ahead whatever the weather (unless conditions are dangerous) so please dress children appropriately.

AND FINALLY..... ROAD SAFETY





Did You Know?

School Keep Clear markings outside School entrances must be kept clear of Stationary vehicles, even if picking up or dropping off Children. An upright sign will be nearby.

Highway Code Rule 238

You must not wait or park, or stop to set down and pick up passengers, on school entrance markings.

Single and double yellow lines denote parking restrictions. A **single yellow line** means no waiting or parking during times shown on a sign nearby. A **double yellow line** means no waiting or parking at any time. Kerb markings mean no loading or unloading.

Highway Code Rule 238 You must not wait or park on yellow lines during the times of operation. Double yellow lines indicate a prohibition of waiting at any time even if there are no upright signs.









H bar road markings are to deter parking over driveways and other vehicle access points. Obstruction can result in a fine by the police or Local Authority. Parking on or near a junction can also cause a safety obstruction.

Highway Code Rule 243


Do not park opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space



Where possible walk or cycle to School to help with creating a safer and healthier zone around School.

Parking fully or partially across a dropped kerb, such as a driveway, is classed as an obstruction and could result in a penalty notice from the Police or Local Authority.

Blocking a dropped kerb, pavement or parking on a <u>crossing causes problems</u> for pedestrians trying to use a safer place to cross. This particularly affects people with disabilities or Pushchairs.



Do not park where the kerb has been lowered to help wheelchair users and powered mobility vehicles.



Please find above some information sent form the LA setting out parking issues and how these are covered in the Highway code. Inconsiderate parking around Schools causes congestion, inconvenience for residents and potential danger for everyone.

In the first four days of the new school year I have a complaint from a local resident who has had a white H bar painted on the road outside his house and still parents are parking across his drive. Mark, our crossing patrol person has had a parent drive past him (on more than one occasion) whilst he has been stood in the middle of the road helping families cross.

Thank you to the majority who are careful and respectful drivers. Can we all get on board please to ensure everyone is safe.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

LIVE STREAMING

Live streaming involves broadcasting and watching videos online in real time, often on social media or via platforms like YouTube and Twitch. Viewers can interact through Comments, chats and reactions during the broadcast: such instant engagement makes this an exciting way to share experiences, learn from others and build digital communities. Despite the many positives, live streaming also creates a potential platform for unsuitable content and poses some risks to children: it's essential to keep privacy and safety in mind and comply with each site or app's age restrictions.



THE RISKS?

WHAT ARE

LACK OF AGE VERIFICATION Despite their age restrictions, some platforms don't require proof of age at sign up – meaning that

Despite their age restrictions, some platforms don't require proof of age at sign up — meaning that anyone can register for an account (and potentially pretend to be older or younger than they actually are). In many cases, this means that young live streamers can never be totally certain exactly who they are broadcasting to and who is engaging with their live stream.

DISCLOSING PERSONAL INFO

is the ability for videos to be instantly shared worldwide. Without the correct privacy settings enabled, a child could inadvertently reveal personal information or their location, making them vulnerable to online predators or identity theft. It's wise to regularly check the privacy settings (and what data is being shared) on any apps your child has signed up for.

ANYTHING COULD HAPPEN

As the video streams are live, children might encounter (or inadvertently share) inappropriate content. Most live-streaming apps have rules to prevent this and monitor their services, also providing report buttons where content can be flagged for review. It may not be dealt with instantly, however, meaning that your child could be further exposed to harmful content during a live stream.



Advice for Parents & Carers

PUT PRIVACY FIRST MANAGE MULTISTREAMING

rough the streaming app's settings, switch urchild's account to 'private', so only their friends of followers can see their broadcasts. You could also not the live chat, shelelding your child from any setting comments – although viewers' feedback is een seen as an integral part of the fun. Identify any arby Items (such as school uniforms or visible admarks) that could give away your child's location.

GET INVOLVED YOURSELF

Research suggests a significant number of streams show a child on their own, often in a supposed safe space like their bedroom. If your child wants to live stream, ask if you could be present because you're interested in how it works. You could even set up your own account to gain a more detailed knowledge of what your child falks about in their live streams – and who they're broadcasting to.

TALK ABOUT LIVE STREAMING

Try to start with positives before discussing potential risks. You could ask which live streaming apps your child likes and how they use them. Do they just watch streams or create their own? Explain why it's unwise to reveal personal information while streaming (even to friends). If you feel your child's too young for live streams, explain your reasoning to them and perhaps agree to review this decision in the future.



CONSIDER THEIR ONLINE REPUTATION

As the broadcasts are live, it often causes the misconception among young people that whatever happens in their video simply vanishes' once the stream ends. However, videos can stay online indefinitely or be recorded by other users. It's important that your child understands what they do and say in a live stream could potentially damage their online reputation and, quite possibly, be seen by prospective future employers, colleges or universities.



Should lifejackets be compulsory for all on open water?



In the news this week

In Canada, the government in the province of Ontario is set to pass a new law that will make it compulsory for children aged 12 and under to wear lifejackets on boats. Parents, guardians, or other adults supervising children could be subject to a fine of up to \$200 (£130) if they do not comply. In the UK, currently, there is no legal requirement for anyone using rivers and seas for leisure purposes to wear a lifejacket/personal flotation device (PFD).

- Can you make a list of all the times you think lifejackets should be worn?
- Do you feel there should be laws in place to ensure people wear lifejackets on boats at sea? If so, do you believe they should apply to everyone?
