AUTISM IN SCHOOLS PROJECT

Following on from a recent, whole school assembly, focusing on neuro-divergence, Cheryl Knupfer (Strategic Lead for Autism) and Jacob (Autism Ambassador, Lived Experience expert trainer) will be running sessions within school as part of the autism in schools project, to capture children's voices. If you would like your child to be involved then please contact Mr Swire, Inclusion Lead.

During the sessions they will:

- Introduce the project – supporting neuro-divergent young people at school
- Capture the young people's views to reflect on their experience of school
- Complete a school walk to capture their views re the environment
- Think about how they are currently supported, what is good, discuss any things they would like to change
- Plan a sensory space
- Feed views in to training for staff
- Discuss trips etc. and plan a visual guide for changes
- Transition ideas from one year to next

KS2 SATS

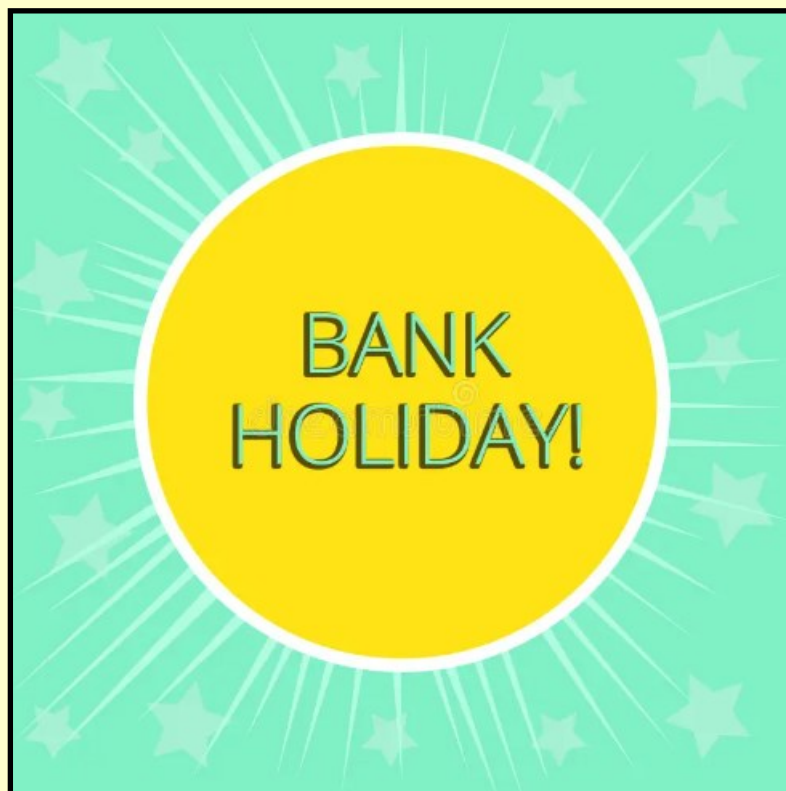
Year 6 will be taking their tests the week commencing 13th May. Please ensure your child is in school and on time.

In the news this week

A new study from the Journal of Archaeological Method and Theory, using evidence found in northwestern Italy, has found that Neanderthals (an extinct relative of humans) organised their living areas in a similar way to people today. It was thought that Neanderthals' lives weren't as sophisticated as this or as similar to those of modern humans. The researchers looked at sites of both Neanderthals and Homo sapiens and compared how things like tools and animal bones were positioned in the living area. They found Neanderthals organised their items depending on the different tasks and activities they were doing.

- Think about how organised or tidy people at your home or school are. Is everyone the same?

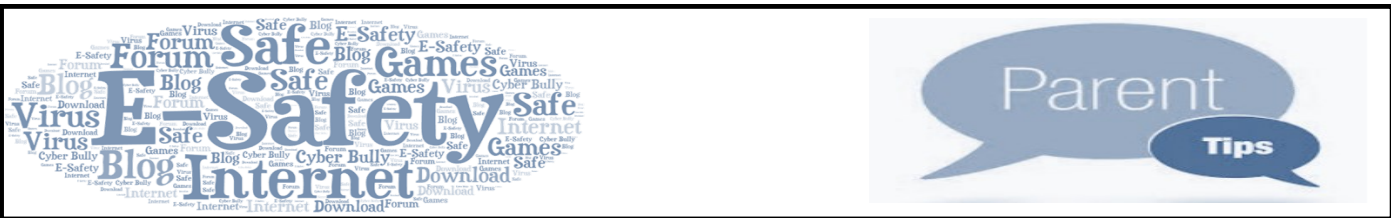

By children's age group, the percentage of parents who felt less able to manage their child's screentime were ...



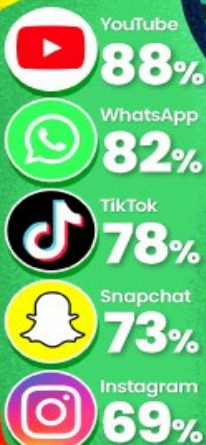
POPULAR PLATFORMS

Over-12s



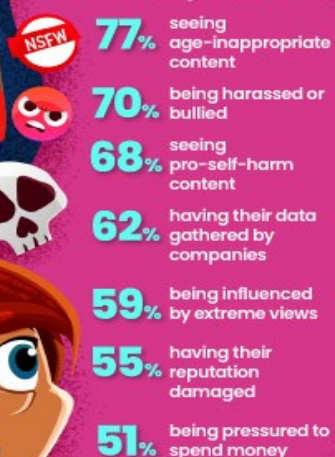
ONLINE GAMING
