Curriculum Overview

Our curriculum at Neale-Wade Academy is underpinned by our Vision and Values.

Opportunity + Success = Pride + Confidence

Neale-Wade Academy is an inclusive learning environment where high expectations and positive relationships underpin a dual focus on academic progress and personal development.

Students in all key stages follow a curriculum which is broad, balanced, and designed to meet their needs. There is a clear rationale that the curriculum should allow our students to develop the knowledge, skills and cultural capital to make sense of the world they live in. We believe that knowledge sticks to knowledge and that exposure to carefully sequenced knowledge and concepts will allow students to develop into inquisitive and analytical thinkers who can apply key skills across a variety of contexts. **Confidence** can only be built through **successful** experiences. Being able to acquire new knowledge, learn new skills, and build our cultural capital is vital for our personal development and our goal is to provide these **opportunities** for all.

It is our belief, that the curriculum should be as broad as possible for as long as possible. We value our students as individuals with different skills and talents. We want them to experience a full range of subjects so that they can make informed decisions about areas of specialism as they progress through the school. Whilst there should always be a focus on academic outcomes, there is a strong moral imperative that our curriculum must create strong, independent citizens who can ask important questions and critically assess the information they receive. In this context, skills such as literacy and numeracy, evaluation and communication skills, hold value alongside academic knowledge.

Equal weight is placed on academic, creative, and vocational **opportunities** because we recognise the place these have in modern Britain and the part they can play in inspiring and **proud** learners. **Pride** in ourselves, our school and community are paramount. This enables us to be outward looking, have the capacity to support one another, whilst being positive about our own well-being and happiness.

Promoting the personal development of our students is a key driver of our curriculum design which maintains a significant focus on the explicit provision of PSHE, Religious Studies, SMSC and extensive extra-curricular **opportunities**. **Pride** is only consolidated by our **confidence**. The **confidence** to know what we are good at or not, what we enjoy or not, is so important in building our own identity. The more confident we are in our own abilities, skills and attributes, we become more resilient and happier within ourselves.

Primary Transition Programme

As one of the most significant steps in your child's education, we take pride in providing a transition programme which is tailored to each individual's needs.

Students and parents are invited to enjoy our open evening which will allow you to look round the Academy and experience some sample activities, meet our students as well as hearing from such key people such as Mr Graham Horn, our principal and Ms Claire Howlett our Transition Lead.

Throughout the year we liaise closely with our partnership primary schools and students are invited into the Academy for various sports and cultural events. During May I visit all our local primary schools to launch the transition process. We meet with all the Year 6 primary school teachers to understand the needs of every student and ensure that they are placed appropriately in tutor groups as well as teaching groups.

In July, Year 6 students have the opportunity to come to Neale-Wade and experience two days with their new year group. The students partake in a variety of PE and creative activities designed to help them bond and reduce any anxieties they may have. In addition to this there is a parent information evening in July which will give parents the opportunity to meet the tutor and ask any questions.

Neale-Wade Facilities

Neale-Wade was formed in 1876 on a site in Station Road, March. We moved to Wimblington Road in 1964 and then underwent a full re-build under the BSF initiative in 2012.

As part of this the Academy has an impressive atrium area which is used as a social gathering space and is the hub of the school. The 100 acre site has large sports fields, an Astro-turf facility as well as a large sports hall, dance studio and newly equipped gym.

Netball courts were refurbished in 2022 and are used for tennis as well. We have two fully equipped catering rooms, vast DT and art spaces, two drama studios with a stage which backs onto the Main Hall with tiered seating for performances and new lighting.

The Academy hosts a 60 seater lecture theatre, five computer suites as well as five laptop trolleys. We have music teaching rooms as well as various practise rooms for one to one lessons.

Our SEND department has a decompression room. All English, Maths, MFL, Humanities and Science rooms are fitted with large ultra high definition screens. We employ our own catering team to serve a variety of delicious and nutritious meals every day. We have two libraries and dedicated reading rooms.

Our outside Quad spaces enable students to enjoy some fresh air during break times.
