Please read the poem below and answer the attached questions.

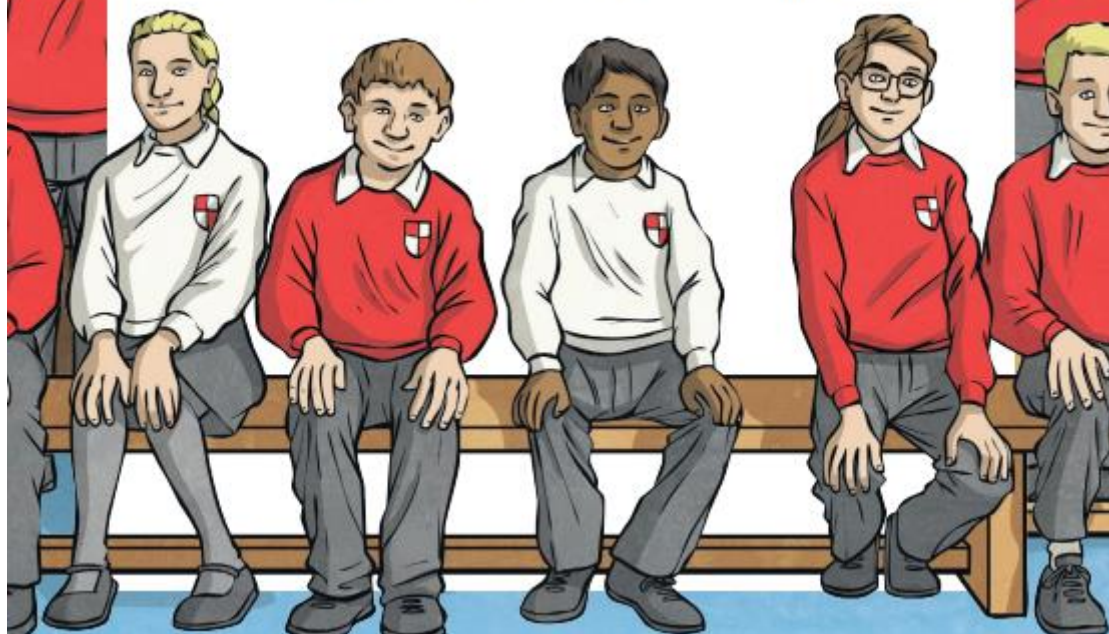
The End of the Year

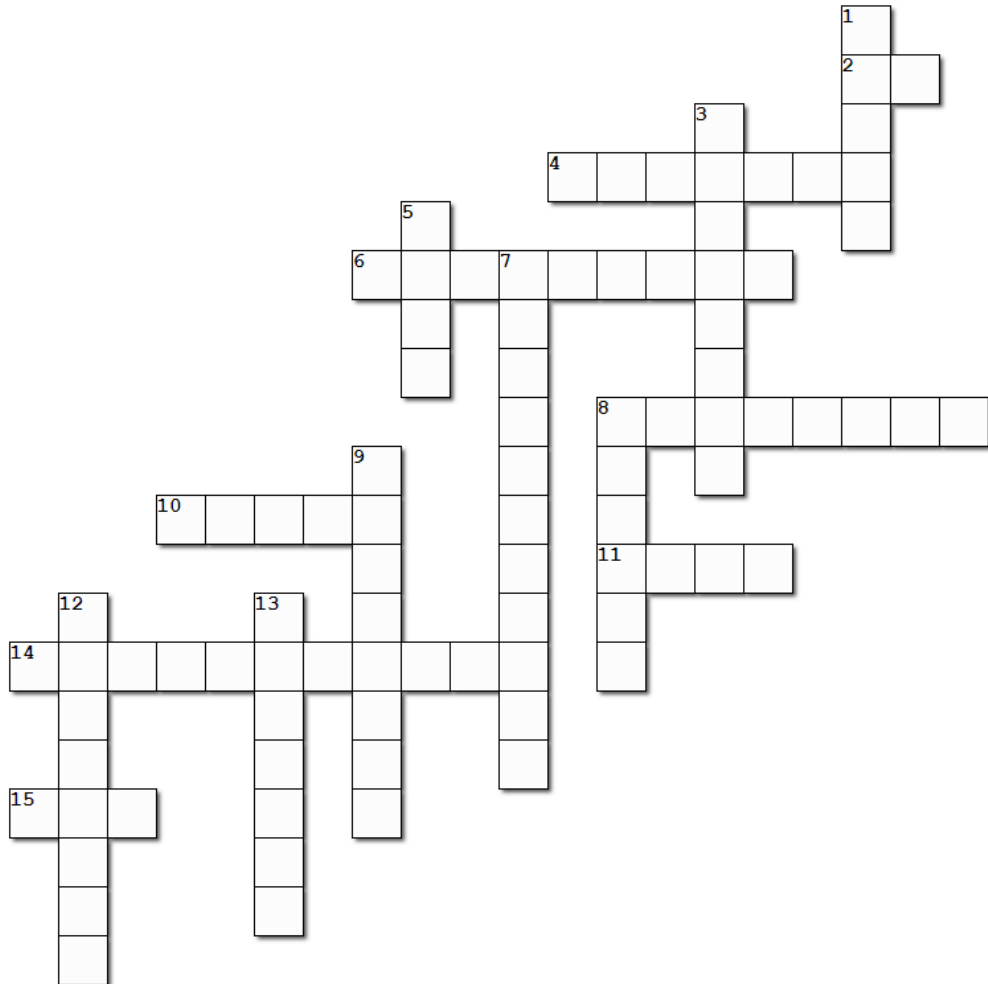



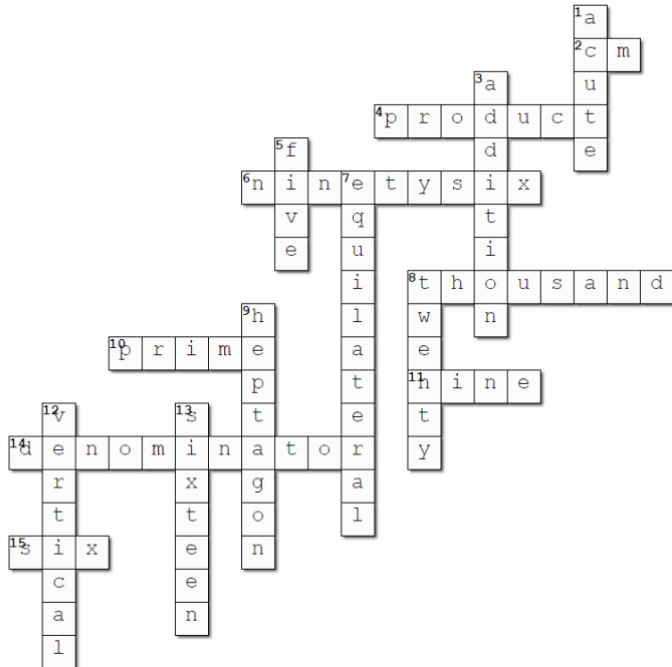
