Daily reading

Enjoy reading your book today for 10-15 minutes. Have a go at challenging yourself with some questions to support your understanding.

Create a list of any words you don't know the meaning of and have a guess at what they could mean. At the end of the story, go back and discuss their definitions.

Top Tips:

- · Prior to reading, encourage your child to focus on the title of the book, the author, the illustrator and the front cover. Make predictions about what you think will happen in this book based on these factors. Afterwards, read the blurb and see if it gives you any further hints.
- · Continue asking your child questions throughout the book but also encourage them to ask questions as this will further their understanding of the text.
- · When you have finished the story, is your child able to retell the events in the order in which they happened? If you are reading non-fiction, can they recall any interesting facts that they have read?

Daily counting, number bonds or times tables

Catch the counts! Grab yourself a soft ball or a teddy and say a number you are going to start on, throw the ball/teddy and the person catching it has to say the next number in the sequence. They then throw it back again and you say the next number again e.g. 15, 20, 25. Try doing this counting in 2s, 5s and 10s. You can go forwards or backwards in your sequence.

Challenge – Try the 3 times tables.

Termly Spellings

This week's spelling pattern focuses on words with the I sound spelt 'al'.


