

Daily reading

Please read for at least half an hour today.

Comprehension - linked to Science:

When Darwin returned from his journey on HMS Beagle, he had an abundance of information to work through. Some of this was in the form of sketches; others were samples of animals and plants. Unfortunately, his note keeping was less than perfect and it took many years to sort out all of the mess. One of the things he had made notes on was the variety of small birds, called finches, found on different islands. He didn't take notes on which island they were found on, and this took even longer to sort out. When the information was finally sorted out, Darwin's friend (John Gould) recognised at once that each of the different finches had a beak designed for a different purpose.



It was this that led Darwin towards the realisation that some species of animals had developed differently, depending on the challenges they faced.

Eventually, Darwin wrote a 230 page explanation of his findings. For an unknown reason, he then put this away and started work on an investigation into barnacles that took him several years. In the end, he declared, "I hate a barnacle as no man ever did before." When Darwin eventually published his theory, the different designs of the beaks was a key element. It proved that different birds had developed different shaped beaks to tackle different food sources. Some had broad beaks suitable for eating seeds whilst others had beaks more suited to grasping insects.

Daily Maths

Fibonacci sequences:

Fibonacci sequences are named after a merchant, one Leonardo of Pisa who had the nickname Fibonacci. On his travels, around 1200 AD, he learnt a lot of mathematics (particularly algebra) in Algeria, Egypt, Syria, Greece, Sicily and Provence (France).

The Arabs had developed the study of mathematics for about 800 years after the fall of the Greek and Roman civilisations. The story behind the methods in this problem spans this whole period.

The Fibonacci sequence is:

1,1,2,3,5,8,13,21...

where each term is the sum of the two terms that go before it (i.e. 1+1=2, 1+2=3, 2+3=5 and so on.)

- 1. What is the sixth term of the Fibonacci type sequence that starts with 2 and 38 as the first two terms?
- 2. Try adding together any three consecutive Fibonacci numbers. What do you notice? Can you explain it?
- 3. Choose any four consecutive Fibonacci numbers. Add the first and last and divide by two. What do you notice? Can you explain it?
- 4. Add together any six consecutive Fibonacci numbers and divide by four. What do you notice? Can you explain it?
- 5.Can you discover any Fibonacci surprises of your own?
