Daily reading

Have a go at testing out your vocabulary knowledge as you read with the questions below.

Example questions to support vocabulary skills:

- What does the word mean in this sentence?
- Find and copy a word which means
- What does this word or phrase tell you about?

Top Tips:

- Prior to reading, encourage your child to focus on the title of the book, the author, the illustrator and the front cover. Make predictions about what you think will happen in this book based on these factors. Afterwards, read the blurb and see if it gives you any further hints.
- Continue asking your child questions throughout the book but also encourage them to ask questions as this will further their understanding of the text.
- When you have finished the story, is your child able to retell the events in the order in which they happened? If you are reading non-fiction, can they recall any interesting facts that they have read?

Daily counting, number bonds or times tables

Times table scavenger hunt:

Hide different times table questions around the house, or garden (if it's not raining). Focus on a mixture of the 2s, 5s and 10s.

Challenge - Include division number sentences as well as multiplication. Can you also include your 3x tables in with this too?

Termly Spellings

This week's spelling pattern focuses on homophones.

- 2. Miss Gatton made 32 cakes for a bake sale and Mrs Titchener made 25 cookies. How many treats did they have altogether to sell?
- 3. Mrs Earle has 64 books to mark. She has marked 36 books already. How many books does she have left to mark?
- 4. Mrs Hansard has 48 strawberries. She shares 23 of the fruits between friends. How many strawberries does she have left?
- 5. There were 45 cows and 48 sheep in a huge field. How many animals were there in the field in total?

Challenge – Have a go at solving these two-step word problems for a further challenge.

- 1. A photographer takes 54 photographs in a day. She takes 13 in the morning and 15 in the afternoon. She takes the rest of the photographs in the evening. How many photographs does she take in the evening?
- 2. In a cark park there were 25 cars parked in the morning. By the afternoon 36 more cars parked in the car park. By the evening 51 cars left the car park. How many cars were now left?
