

Daily reading

It's really important that we understand the texts we read. A really good way to do this is to have a discussion about what we have read. Roll and retell allows you to do this and you can play with fiction or non-fiction books. If you don't have a dice, you could make your own or simply write down numbers 1-6 on strips of paper and turn them over instead of a roll.



Top Tips:

- · Prior to reading, encourage your child to focus on the title of the book, the author, the illustrator and the front cover. Make predictions about what you think will happen in this book based on these factors. Afterwards, read the blurb and see if it gives you any further hints.
- · Continue asking your child questions throughout the book but also encourage them to ask questions as this will further their understanding of the text.
- · When you have finished the story, is your child able to retell the events in the order in which they happened? If you are reading non-fiction, can they recall any interesting facts that they have read.

Daily counting, number bonds or times tables

Number bonds with nature:

Hunt around your garden or local area with your grown up to search for some pebbles, leaves or something you could write on. Use chalk or paint and write numbers of your choice up to 100 on each item you collect. Once you have written these, turn the items over so that you can't see the numbers. Then, start to turn them back over, look at the number and say the matching number bond to 100. Make it more challenging by using a one minute timer. How many numbers can you match in that

time? Of course, you can do this with number bonds to 10 or 20 and you can also do this with items indoors too!

First you will need to grab yourself a pen and cut up some strips of paper. On each strip, you will need to write an exact measurement e.g. '35cm' or something like 'more than one metre' and on another, 'less than 30 cm' and so on. You could challenge yourself further by using the <, > and = symbols on your strips too e.g. < 50cm (less than 50cm). Put your strips into a bag and take yourself outside (you could do this as part of your daily exercise). Along your walk, pull out a strip, read what it says and then try to find something of that measurement. Use your measuring device and record it in a table or write what you found of that measurement on the same strip. Challenge – Have a go at doubling the measurements you record. Can you then compare the doubled measurements using the <, > and = symbols? **Dictated sentence:**

Writing:

Today, we are going to prepare for some writing, ready for tomorrow. You will need a pen, some paper and your imagination. Are you ready?

As part of your daily exercise, we would like you to go on a stroll. Take yourselves into the local woods, through fields or simply around where you live. Draw pictures of what you see, make a list of the things you spot and use adjectives and noun phrases to describe them. Collect things along the way if you like, it might help you to add interesting description. You could create a mind map of your walk and when you get back home, you may like to add colour to your mind map. It should be full of pictures and words. Can you talk through it with your grown up to explain what you did and saw on your walk?

Challenge – Try to find a range of different adjectives to describe what you saw. Can you improve any adjectives by using a thesaurus to find alternative words?
