Termly Spellings	Please take time to learn spellings for future weeks and to re-visit past spellings.

	Write the word out on a sheet of paper ensuring that it is spelt correctly and it is large enough to
	trace over.
	Trace over the word and say it at the same time.
	Move next to the word you have just written and write it out as you say it.
	Turn the page over and write the word as you say it, and then check that you have spelt it correctly.
Daily Maths	Looking at repeating patterns.

Show the picture below and describe the patterns.

Think about the positional language we learnt about.



Then ask questions about the patterns.

e.g. What is 8th in the sequence?

What would be 10th in the sequence?

What would be 14th in the sequence?

When would you see another green dragon?

Have a go at making a pattern of your own. You can use anything you want.

Maybe you can choose leaves, sticks, Lego, toys, coins or pasta or you could draw pictures or use ink stamps.

Try and describe the pattern and then ask someone a question about your pattern.

Can they say what comes next?

Daily English/ Writing: **Phonics** Following on from yesterday, we are linking our writing to our learning in geography. Yesterday, we learnt about a hot place. Can you tell an adult what we learnt? Today, we are going to learn about If you can, watch the video clips here - https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/articles/zdpn7yc Don't worry if you can't, get your grown up to read the information below to you. Then talk about it. Antarctica is a **continent** of land at the very bottom of our planet. It is a **desert** - but it's not hot, it's really, really **cold**. The winter temperature can be minus 60°C. It's called a desert because it hardly ever rains. During the summer, the sun never sets so it is light all the time. In the winter, it is dark all of the time. No people live in Antarctica permanently. Not many animals live there apart from penguins and seals. Now, imagine that you have visited Antarctica! Write a postcard home explaining what it is like. Draw the postcard in your book – you may need an adult to help you with this. Remember to start each sentence with a capital letter and end with a full stop. As always, try to make your writing interesting by including adjectives and words like and, but or because to extend sentences. For something really tricky, challenge yourself to include a question. Remember the special punctuation that a question needs. If you have a globe at home, you might like to try and identify the cold areas and show them to a grown up or someone else in your family. Dictated sentence: Please read the sentence to your child. Then re-read slowly one word at a time while your child writes the sentence. Traffic lights can be green, red or yellow. Extension – Can you extend your sentence using and/because/when? Copy the following real and alien words, then put sound buttons on them. Press the buttons to read the words. woodland bimler chicken vapoin Can you put each of these common exception words into a sentence? go SO by Optional game – https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/topics/zd63xyc/articles/zdp4pg8 Time Challenge: - Draw or mark out a line on the floor - if you can, do this outside. How many times **Healthy Me** can you jump from one side of the line to the other in 2 minutes? Scent Trail - Go to a nearby wood or park and try to find the smelliest plant that you can. Try to use words like beautiful/ugly, nice/stinky, strong/weak, flowery/spicy, sweet/savoury when describing. **Problem of the** Challenge: Can you make something that shows the different seasons? Day Use Lego, blocks, recycling objects (make sure you check with an adult if they are clean and safe to use) to make your creations.
