Move next to the word you have just written and write it out as you say it.

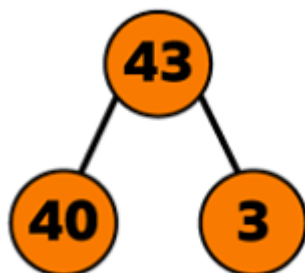
Turn the page over and write the word as you say it, and then check that you have spelt it correctly.

Partitioning numbers:

Look at the number 43

We can use **part whole chart** to help us.



Children to draw **part whole charts** in their books.

Choose numbers under 100 and partition them into **tens** and **ones**.

Then solve the following questions.

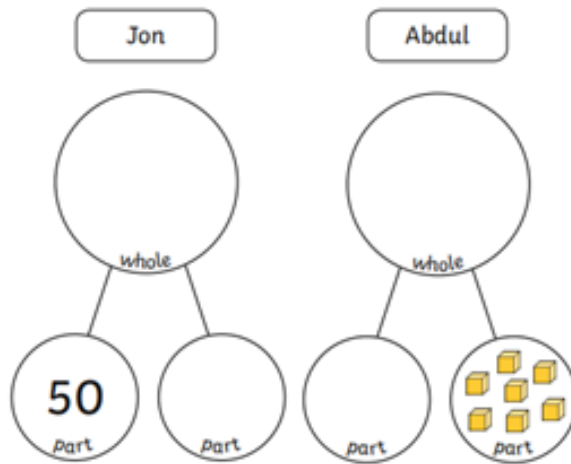
Which number has 3 tens and 8 ones?

Which number has 7 tens and 0 ones?

Which number has 5 tens and 4 ones?

Writing:

Today we're going on a picnic!

First draw a picnic basket in your book and put 6 things in it that you would like to take to a picnic. Now write a list of the things. Try to write each one in a sentence.

For example –

1. My first choice would be delicious, sweet strawberries.

Remember to include a capital letter, finger spaces and full stop for each sentence. You should also include lots of adjectives to describe the food.

Dictated sentence:

Please read the sentence to your child. Then re-read slowly one word at a time while your child writes the sentence.

We can watch acrobats at the circus.

Extension – Can you extend your sentence using **and/because/when**?

Copy the following real and alien words, then put sound buttons on them. Press the buttons to read the words.
