Daily reading	How did you get on with your book club yesterday? Were you able to share some of your favourite stories with your family?
	Today, we would like you to have a go at practising your summarising skills whilst you read.
	<ul> <li>Example questions to support summarising:</li> <li>Can you number these events from 1-5 in the order in which they happened?</li> <li>What happened after?</li> <li>What was the first thing that happened in the story?</li> <li>Can you summarise in a sentence the opening/middle/end of the story?</li> <li>In what order do these chapter headings come in the story?</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Top Tips:</li> <li>Prior to reading, encourage your child to focus on the title of the book, the author, the illustrator and the front cover. Make predictions about what you think will happen in this book based on these factors. Afterwards, read the blurb and see if it gives you any further hints.</li> <li>Continue asking your child questions throughout the book but also encourage them to ask questions as this will further their understanding of the text.</li> <li>When you have finished the story, is your child able to retell the events in the order in which they happened? If you are reading non-fiction, can they recall any interesting facts that they have read?</li> </ul>
