## Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> June:

Good morning Year 1. Did you manage to guess the answer to yesterday's riddle? The answer was **an icicle**. Did you know that icicles mainly form on the south side of buildings? This is because the sun shines on the south side of buildings, so any snow and ice already in place on that south side will melt, forming drips of water in singular locations along an edge of the building. At night, when the air temperature drops, it is those dripping locations that will freeze first. Here are some activities for you to do today.

Daily reading	Today, please read a book of your choice for 10 minutes then spend 5 minutes retelling what you have read and answering questions about it. Please ask an adult to help you with this.
	Thinking about the book you are reading at the moment, is there anything you would change about this story?

Daily counting,	This week, we will focus on knowing number bonds to 10 (or any number up to 20) without using
number bonds or	resources to work them out. Children should be able to recall the answers quickly.
times tables	Number bonds that equal 10.
	Show a number card from yesterday (0-10). E.g. 6
	Child recalls what number bond goes with it to make 10. E.g. 4
	If they get it right, they can keep the card; if they get it wrong, it goes to the bottom of the pile.
	The game ends when the child has all of the cards.
Termly Spellings	Please take time to learn spellings for future weeks and to re-visit past spellings.

	You might want to try rainbow writing to do this.
	Using coloured pencils in different ways can help to make parts of words memorable. You could
	highlight the tricky parts of the word or write the tricky part in a different colour. You could also write
	each letter in a different colour, or write the word in red, then overlay in orange, yellow and so on.
Daily Maths	Look at the <b>picture of the bakery</b> .
	Ask the children to explain where various items in the shop are, using positional language. e.g. Where is the loaf of bread? The loaf of bread is <b>on</b> the shelf <b>above</b> the birthday cake. Where is the chocolate cake? The chocolate cake is <b>in between</b> the rolls and the cake stand.
	Choose a position, such as <b>below</b> or <b>next to</b> and ask children to tell you a sentence with the position in.
	Where can we put the cookies and the gingerbread me?
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	Children to draw a fish tank on a whole page in their books (we will need to write next to this
	tomorrow so choose a new double page).
	In the fish tank draw
	A small blue fish
	A mermaid
	A treasure chest
	3 goldfish swimming together
	1 extra item.
	Tomorrow we will describe their position.

Also, if you use the name of the season, remember it will need a capital letter.
