Daily reading

Read for pleasure for at least 30 minutes. Remember, look up in a dictionary or ask for help if there are any words where you are not sure of their meaning.

Take some time to read out loud. By re-reading a small section of text over and over, you can practise your intonation (the rise and fall of your voice) and expression (changing your voice to show meaning). Why not try reading in a different voice completely? For example: reading in a sad voice, like a monster... or even like a cowboy, yee haw!

Daily Maths

Today's learning objective is: **Translation**.

In geometry, translation means moving a shape into a different position, without changing it in any way. Today, you will need to translate shapes on a grid by focusing on one vertex at a time. Attention should be drawn to the fact that the shape itself does not change size nor orientation when translated.


These questions can help prompt discussion beforehand: What does translate mean?

Look what happens when I translate this shape. What has happened to the shape? Have the dimensions of the shape changed? Does it still face the same way?

Are there any other ways I can get the shape to this position?


A square is translated two squares to the right and three down. Draw the new position of this square.

Describe the translation of shape A to shape B, C and then D. Use the stem sentence to help you. Shape A has been



Match the translations.



Triangle ABC is translated so that point B translates to point D




Do you agree with Amir? Explain your thinking.

If you would rather learn maths through a more practical task - try this:

Using the square paper in your exercise book, draw the **x** and **y** axes to create your first quadrant (go at least 10 squares across and 10 squares up). Then, draw a shape or a picture (call this shape A) and translate it to form a new shape (shape B). Finally, record in your book the translation from shape A to shape B.

Shape B has been translated 4 right and 4 down from shape A.
