Daily Maths	Length Scavenger Hunt		
	Step 1: Watch this clip on measuring cm using a ruler: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=tuBLuIW1U70		
	Step 2: Give children a ruler with cm on. Go around the house and measure the lengths of different objects. Keep the length simple for less confident children, for example 10 cms, 20 cms. Make it trickier for more confident children, for example 12 cm, 23 cm. (Only read to cm not mm).		
	Step 3: Gather all the items together and compare the lengths, getting the children to order them from shortest to longest.		
Daily English/ Phonics	Dictated sentence: Please read the sentence to your child. Then re-read slowly one word at a time while your child writes the sentence.
