Make predictions about what you think will happen in this book based on these factors. Afterwards, read the blurb and see if it gives you any further hints.</li> <li>Continue asking your child questions throughout the book but also encourage them to ask questions, as this will further their understanding of the text.</li> <li>When you have finished the story, is your child able to retell the events the order in which they happened? If you are reading non-fiction can they recall any interesting facts that they have read.</li> </ul> |

Make sure you stir it well.</li> <li>Turn on the hob to a low heat.</li> <li>Next, melt a little butter in the frying pan but be careful not to burn yourself.</li> <li>Pour enough mixture into the pan to make a thin pancake.</li> <li>After a few minutes, toss or turn the pancake over to cook the other side.</li> <li>When it is golden serve the pancake on a plate and put on your favourite topping.</li> <li>Finally eat your perfect pancakes but don't forget to do the washing up!</li> </ol> |
