Daily reading

Interesting insects:

Yesterday as part of the 'Healthy Me' section, you built a bug hotel. Spring is such an amazing season to spot wildlife so why not impress your friends and family by learning astonishing facts to share with them. Explore non-fiction books or get online if you can, to read about the different types of insects you might be lucky enough to find in your bug hotel. You may like to read about a range of butterflies, beetles or bees so that you are full of interesting insect knowledge!

Remember to enjoy reading a range of books at home too. Are you still enjoying your reading den? Can you update your den or put it in a new corner of your house?



Top Tips:

- · Prior to reading, encourage your child to focus on the title of the book, the author, the illustrator and the front cover. Make predictions about what you think will happen in this book based on these factors. Afterwards, read the blurb and see if it gives you any further hints.
- · Continue asking your child questions throughout the book but also encourage them to ask questions, as this will further their understanding of the text.
- · When you have finished the story, is your child able to retell the events in the order in which they happened? If you are reading non-fiction, can they recall any interesting facts that they have read?

Daily counting, number bonds or times tables

Bang! Bang! - How to play:

- Step 1: Two players stand back to back, cowboy shootout style.
- Step 2: A question is called out, such as 'What is 4 x 5?'
- Step 3: The first player to turn, face their opponent, shout 'Bang! Bang!' and to give the correct answer, wins a point.
- Step 4: This is then repeated until a number of points, decided at the start of the game, is reached. The player with the most points is of course the winner!

Challenge: Include division facts within the game to test your inverse operation knowledge.

Termly Spellings

This week's spelling pattern focuses on words ending in – **tion**. How are you getting on learning your spellings?

Have a go at finding different items around the house or garden to spell out the letters. You could make the words using pebbles, spoons, teabags, fair trade items, corks etc.



Longer or shorter than a metre?

Writing:

Yesterday, you began writing your 'how to make a brilliant bug hotel' instructions. Now, you should have a title and a 'You will need' section. Today, underneath yesterday's writing you are going to write numbered steps to explain the method. Remember to use your 'You will need section' to help you.

Use the example to support your writing:

Method

- 1. First find a safe spot to collect your items to make the bug hotel.
- 2. Next hunt for dried, crispy leaves to create a bed for your insects.
- 3. Then carefully collect long, thick sticks so that your mini beasts can climb.

Top tips - Use time adverbials - first, next, then, after that - Include bossy verbs – cut, slice, pour, stick - Pictures – they make it clear for the reader - Add your own safety tip at the end Challenge – Have a go at using adverbs (ly words) in your instructions to describe the verbs (action words) e.g. Carefully collect long, thick sticks. **Healthy Me** Last Saturday 9th May, was World Fair Trade Day. Do you know what is meant by Fair Trade? Have a look in your cupboards and fridge to see if you can find any foods with the Fair Trade label. You may like to research to find out more about Fair Trade and why it is important. Can you have a go at designing a new Fair Trade logo? Problem of the Challenge – Mrs Titchener's Tower! Mrs Titchener wants you to create the tallest tower you can for day her. It needs to be free standing and built out of items of your choice. Think toilet roll tubes, paper, Lego, twigs or anything you can think of that will add to the height. Can you build your tower taller than yourself? This would be great to build your maths into as you could measure the height of the tower each time you add to it. **Today's riddle** – What gets bigger the more you take away?
