Anti-Bullying Week 11<sup>th</sup> – 15<sup>th</sup> November: Anti-Bullying Week 2024 is an annual campaign aimed at raising awareness about bullying, its impact on individuals, and the importance of preventing bullying in schools, communities, and online spaces. This week-long initiative brings together schools, organisations, parents, and individuals to promote kindness, empathy, and respect, and to create a safe and inclusive environment for everyone. This year's theme is 'Choose Respect'.

Regardless of a national campaign, we take all allegations of bullying seriously, at all times. The Anti-Bullying Alliance has an agreed shared definition of bullying - 'The repetitive, intentional hurting of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an imbalance of power. #### **Fixed Penalty Notice**

If your child misses school because of an unauthorised absence of 10 sessions (or 5 days), the school may issue penalty notices.

Penalty notices will be issued separately to each parent, and for each child. The fine for each penalty notice is £120, with 28 days to pay. If you pay within 21 days, the fine is reduced to £60 for each penalty notice.

For example, a family with two parents (1&2) and two children (A&B) taking unauthorised absence would receive the following penalties:

- Parent 1 = 1 penalty for child A plus 1 penalty for child B = 2 penalties
- Parent 2 = 1 penalty for child A plus 1 penalty for child B = 2 penalties
   Total payable by the family = 4 penalties (or £480).

If the family in this example had paid their fine within 21 days of being issued the penalty notice, they would have had to pay £240.
