Dear Parents and Carers.

Thank you for your continued support in all we aim to achieve at Newbridge.

School Development Work: As shared, our main priorities this year are: improving outcomes in Writing, Reading and Phonics, improving outcomes for vulnerable groups, and committing to OPAL – Outdoor Play and Learning. For writing, we are working closely with an English consultant, led by Mrs Edmunds, to revise how teachers plan for the delivery of the national curriculum objectives. This revision means that each unit taught is now based on carefully selected books. The progression of grammar which needs to be taught in each year group has also been reviewed.

We have moved to a new phonics teaching scheme which is recognised by the DfE - Twinkl Phonics. All of the children in Reception to Year 2 are taught synthetic phonics through this programme. The programme is also available to Key Stage 2 teachers to use as they need to. The programme also affords many resources to support the children with spelling and handwriting.

To carefully track the progress of all groups across the school and the impact of interventions, we have moved to a new data package. Not only will this provide high level information, but it will support the teachers and senior leaders with their workload.

Excitingly, we held our second planning meeting with our OPAL mentor, today. Having visited three schools who have achieved platinum status within this programme, the next step is to provide whole school training which will take place on the Inset day at the end of term. You can read more about the aims of OPAL here.

Reading Meeting for Parents and Carers: There is a meeting about supporting your Key Stage 2 child with reading, on Thursday 17th October at 2.30pm. There is no need to sign-up, please come along. All resources from this will be posted on Google Classroom.

Valuing Difference: We are hosting a Valuing Difference Day on Friday, 18th October to celebrate how diverse backgrounds, abilities and experiences enrich our world. We are looking for community volunteers to share their stories, especially those from ethnic minorities, with disabilities or who have overcome adversity. Sessions will last about 30 minutes, involving a talk and a question and answer session with one year group. If you or someone you know would like to participate, please contact the office by Monday 14th October. After school there will be a 'cultural cake sale' – details of this are below.

'500 Words' Writing Competition: Mrs Edmunds, our Writing leader, is keen to promote the well-known '500 Words' Writing Competition. The UK's largest children's writing competition has categories for 5-7 year olds and 8-11 year olds. Please find more information about the competition here. If children wish to enter, parents and carers will need to do this, however, we would love to share any entries in school.

Celebrating Harvest: We're excited to celebrate Harvest with our annual assembly on Thursday, 24th October. This year, we kindly ask families to donate a non-perishable food item or toiletry. Donations will go to Julian House, a Bath charity supporting the homeless and The Nest Project, which helps families with children under 5. Julian House needs tinned goods (tomatoes, soup, vegetables, meat, and fruit), pasta sauce, and long-life fruit juice. The Nest Project needs nappies, baby wipes, body wash, shampoo, baby lotion, and nappy cream. Please drop off donations in the Upper School foyer on Thursday 24th October, before school.

Volume of emails: The office has seen a significant increase in the number of emails received from parents each day. The office staff will continue to be prompt in responding, however, please be aware that messages will be prioritised and the three day response time may not always be met while the volume is high.

Year 6 Fleet Air Arm Museum

On Friday the 4th of October, Year 6 visited the Fleet Air Arm Museum in Yeovilton, to learn more about WW2 and its aircrafts.

Hall 1

When we arrived, Year 6 was split into 4 groups ready to explore their part of the museum. Hall 1 was about WWI. There were helicopters and aircrafts used in 1914 – 1919. We were allowed inside most of these fantastic aircrafts and we also got to dress up in full uniform!

been upgraded since 1919. The public were allowed in an aircraft, which had a cockpit that you could sit inside, and from there you could already tell that even in WW2, learning how to fly a plane was not easy. Most of the planes had folded wings (these

specific aircrafts were used on aircraft carriers so that they wouldn't take up storage). After we had eaten our lunch, we went to play in the park then headed off to our next hall.

Hall 3

This hall has a replica of what it would be like onboard an aircraft carrier. As we

adventured further in, we went past a projection of what it would be like looking over the railings into the vast ocean. After finishing that part, we were taken to an elevator simulator, which told

you about the jobs onboard. Following on from this, we walked through control rooms at the top of the ship.

Hall 4

Hall 4 had the incredible Concorde in it as well as other famous aircrafts like the Baracuda (which is being repaired). There were helicopters and planes as well. Concorde was even open to the public and we got to see what it was like inside! Surprisingly, it was very thin, but long! You got to go from the rear all the way to the cockpit.

Online Safety at Newbridge Primary School

Fixed Penalty Notice

If your child misses school because of an unauthorised absence of 10 sessions (or 5 days), the school may issue penalty notices.

Penalty notices will be issued separately to each parent, and for each child. The fine for each penalty notice is £120, with 28 days to pay. If you pay within 21 days, the fine is reduced to £60 for each penalty notice.

For example, a family with two parents (1&2) and two children (A&B) taking unauthorised absence would receive the following penalties:

- Parent 1 = 1 penalty for child A plus 1 penalty for child B = 2 penalties
- Parent 2 = 1 penalty for child A plus 1 penalty for child B = 2 penalties
 Total payable by the family = 4 penalties (or £480).

If the family in this example had paid their fine within 21 days of being issued the penalty notice, they would have had to pay £240.
