Dear Parents and Carers,

Remembrance Assembly: We held our Remembrance Assembly on Monday. The whole school gathered to reflect on the significance of Armistice Day and the importance of paying our respects to those who have lost their lives, fought or been injured in war. William, Isla, Elsa and Jake from Year 6 read poems they had written about Remembrance and the impact of war. These were sensitive and powerful. Mrs Keep played the Last Post on a bugle, and we held a two minute silence—it was a poignant moment in a busy school day.

Year 5 out and about: Both Year 5 classes walked to The Herschel Museum of Astronomy in Bath this week. The museum is dedicated to the achievements of the Herschels: astronomers and talented musicians. It was from this house that William Herschel discovered Uranus in 1781. This visit supported further understanding of the Year 5 curriculum about Space.

Year 4 Cross Country Championships: What an afternoon this was on Wednesday!! Oh my goodness, I could not believe the results when the team came back to Newbridge after participating at the Glass House Playing Fields. Read on for Mr Wallace's round-up. NPSA Meeting: It was a pleasure to attend the NPSA meeting on Tuesday evening. It was well-attended and all of the parents present were firmly committed to the values of the NPSA in supporting our children, our school and our community. With reflections of prior events, planning for new and upcoming ones and discussing funds raised, there was much for everyone to celebrate. The NPSA kindly supported our request for funding for musical instruments and a continued commitment to play for all. Thank you, everyone – we are in an incredibly fortunate position to have the NPSA behind us.

There are some NPSA competitions running at the moment, and the winner and runners up will be announced in next week's newsletter. On Friday 22nd November, there will be a cake and uniform sale after school, and thenon the 7th December we look forward to the Christmas Fair and Santa's Grotto.

Punctuality: It is a legal requirement for children to attend school regularly and also for children to be at school on time. The children must be in class for registration at 8.55am, meaning they need to be through the gates by 8.53am, when they are closed. Children arriving after 8.55am are marked as Late (L). Children arriving after 9.10am are marked as Unauthorised (U). If you are late, please make sure you sign your child in at the office.

OPAL – Outdoor Play and Learning: Thanks to the parents and carers who kindly completed the baseline survey about play, to help with the roll-out of OPAL. There is still time to complete it, if you have not done so already here. Thank you also for the donations made so far. Please see the full list below in case you have anything to donate. Please can all parents send their child to school with a waterproof coat with a hood, each day, so that we can play outside in all weathers. We will keep you updated on further OPAL plans, as we go.

Anti-Bullying Week: This week was Anti-Bullying Week and from playgrounds to parliament and our phones to our homes, the Anti-Bullying Alliance is calling on everyone to 'Choose Respect'. During the week the children have thought about what it means to support each other to champion kindness, because being kind is not a sign of weakness but a mark of strength. Anti-Bullying Week will have empowered our children to solve problems with empathy and choosing respect even when we might disagree. These messages were reinforced by an assembly led by members of the NET (Newbridge Equality Team) on Wednesday.

The Anti-Bullying Alliance has an agreed shared definition of bullying - 'The repetitive, intentional hurting of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an imbalance of power. Fixed Penalty Notice

If your child misses school because of an unauthorised absence of 10 sessions (or 5 days), the school may issue penalty notices.

Penalty notices will be issued separately to each parent, and for each child. The fine for each penalty notice is £120, with 28 days to pay. If you pay within 21 days, the fine is reduced to £60 for each penalty notice.

For example, a family with two parents (1&2) and two children (A&B) taking unauthorised absence would receive the following penalties:

- Parent 1 = 1 penalty for child A plus 1 penalty for child B = 2 penalties
- Parent 2 = 1 penalty for child A plus 1 penalty for child B = 2 penalties Total payable by the family = 4 penalties (or £480).


If the family in this example had paid their fine within 21 days of being issued the penalty notice, they would have had to pay £240.
