Medical Needs

Medication

It is at the Headteacher's discretion whether or not prescribed medicines can be administered in school, however, we wish to do all we can to support this.

We will only administer medicines which have a doctor's prescription and which are considered conventional medicines. A medical indemnity form must be completed by the parent/carer and handed to the school office prior to medication being administered. This form can be found on the school website here.

Children must not bring medicines in to school. For safety reasons, medicines must be handed to the office by the parent/carer and returned to the parent/carer. All medicines must be clearly named.

Sickness and Diarrhoea

An infection causing diarrhoea and vomiting can be easily passed to others. Anyone with gastroenteritis should be regarded as very infectious and must be kept away from school until the diarrhoea and vomiting has stopped and they have been passing normal stools for at least 48 hours. Please contact me, via the School Office, for all concerns regarding children's medical needs.

Attendance Matters

- The school's attendance target is 96.7%.
- Our current whole school attendance is 96.31%.
- Parents and teachers share the responsibility for supporting excellent school attendance and regular attenders make better progress, socially and academically.
- Mrs Hansard, Deputy Headteacher, is responsible for school attendance. and with staff members will work with pupils and parents to remove any barriers to good attendance.
- Parents and Carers are responsible for contacting the school office staff to report absence before 9.30am on 01225 421675.
- The school gates open at 8.45am and pupils are expected to be on the site by 8.53am and in class by 8.55am for registration.
- 90% attendance is classed as persistent absenteeism – this is equivalent 19 days off school a year.
- We cannot authorise holidays or visits out of school unless there are exceptional circumstances.
- Fixed penalty notices may be issued to parents and carers in accordance with the school's Attendance Policy found here.

Each year harvest donations bring vital supplies to the foodbank, and as we head into the colder months, your gift will be needed to provide 3-day emergency food parcels for local individuals and families in need.

For many this may lead to us providing information and access to further support.
