We are more than half way through this term and are now looking ahead to all of the Christmas activities. Some families won't know what happens around the school nativities and performances, so I have set out the details this week. It gets very busy, so please keep a check on the dates.

#### Feel Good Friday

Today saw our monthly Feel Good Friday. There was no better way to start it, than with a fun dance session with Cheryl from Mojo Move before school. Again, many people – children and adults came along to cut some shapes and definitely feel good about the start of Friday. In class, the children took time and care to think about others and prepared blank Christmas cards for a charity, Compassionate Communities. The day was focused around random acts of kindness.

#### BBC 500 Words Writing Competition

You will know that we encouraged the children to enter the BBC 500 Words Competition. Some enties were shared with the school and so each week we will publish the ones we received in the newsletter. If your child entered, and you did not email it to us, please do so. Thank you and well done to all – we have enjoyed reading your stories.

#### Bath Blitz Walk – Year 6

Class 6N and Class 6KR each took part in a Bath Blitz Walk, this week. Having walked to the centre of Bath, the classes were received by Adrian, who is a Mayor's Guide. He took the children around Bath City Centre, explaining the impact of the Blitz on Bath and pointing out the damage caused to buildings, and the restoration in later years. This enhances the current Year 6 enquiry, 'How do I cope in a crisis?'. The children were respectful and engaged – and were amazed at how Adrian could remember so many facts!

#### Year 3 out and about to Cheddar Gorge

Year 3 have also been out and about this week. They set off first thing this morning for a visit to Cheddar Gorge. This sits with their enquiry 'What makes our world amazing?' We look forward to an report on the visit, next week.

#### Boys' Football – Newbridge v Roundhill

The Year 5 and Year 6 boys had a great result on Tuesday, when they played away at Roundhill. They kept their chins up after last week's tournament, demonstrating resilience and skill. Well done, all!

#### Children's use of phones

We are very aware that more and more children have their own phones. The older children can only bring their phone to school to support their independence when walking to and from school, if absolutely necessary. The phone must be turned off when entering the school site and only turned on after leaving the site. All phones must be handed to the class teacher on arrival at school. We are also aware that children are members of online platforms, such as WhatsApp. Being a part of these groups can cause issues and upset, which we have had to manage in school. Please can I remind all parents that WhatsApp is a platform for young people aged over 16 years. Here you will find some helpful guidance from the NSPCC about safety considerations that must be taken around WhatsApp Is WhatsApp safe for my child? I urge you to read this to help keep your child safe online.

#### Becoming a member of the JLT

Below you will read some details about how children in Year 1 to Year 6 can apply to be members of the JLT – the Junior Leadership Team. This is a school council which will be involved in school and community matters which may include fundraising, the curriculum, online safety, recruitment and representing the school in meetings. All of the application details are posted on Google Classroom for the children to access. We look forward to receiving applications by midnight on Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> November.

#### Google Classroom

Please read the 'blog' posted on Google Classroom today, written by your child's teacher, detailing the learning this week. This update is provided so that parents and carers can continue learning conversations at home. Often, parents tell us that their child does not let them know what happens at school and so this is provided in response to this. If you could leave a simple message or even a thumbs-up, we would love to hear from you and to know the updates are valued.

### **Christmas Choir Tour**

It's a busy time for the choir – everyone loves to hear them sing and we love to give back to our community. They will be singing at the RUH on Friday 1<sup>st</sup> December in the morning. On the same day, they will be singing at the opening of school Christmas Fair. Year 6 choir members will again sing at Stratton House Residential Care Home on Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> December.

### **Lower School Nativity Arrangements**

On Tuesday 5th December and Friday 8<sup>th</sup> December, we will hold the Lower School Nativity performances. Each year, Year 2 pupils lead the performance and act out a short play, with plenty of singing. On Tuesday 5th December Class 2M will be the actors and Class 2R will be the choir. This arrangement will reverse for the Friday. At each performance, the Year 1 and Reception classes will join in by singing a song or performing a dance. Therefore, for Reception and Year 1 parents, it will not matter which performance you attend, unless you have a child in Year 2, and wish to come on the day they are acting. Tickets will not be issued for these performances - instead, parents should wait after drop off or return to queue at the back door of the Upper School hall, for a 9.30am start.

On Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> December, the Lower School will visit Emmanuel Church on Apsley Road. Year 2 children will complete a simple nativity and all of the Lower School will join in with Christmas songs. Parents are welcome to attend, but please know it will be a bit of a squeeze. This performance again starts at 9.30am.

### **Lower School Christmas Parties**

All of the Lower School classes will have a class party on the afternoon of Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> December. The children do not need to bring anything but are allowed to wear their own suitable clothes, should they wish.

### **Upper School Christmas Music Concert**

The Upper School Christmas Concert will take place on Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> December at 7pm and Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> December at 10am. In this, the choir will perform along with other musical items. More details about these concerts will follow, but please know parents and carers are welcome at either performance.
