Young Voices - what an extravaganza!

The highlight has to be the 70 choir members attending Young Voices at the World Resort Arena in Birmingham last Friday. What an incredible experience this was, for everyone – performers, staff, volunteers and families. It was a day and night we will all treasure. For many months, the children have committed to learning the song words and dance movements, both at home and through their attendance at choir rehearsals. Their investment paid off when they could perform with such joy, with over 6,000 other school children, to a packed arena. I am incredibly proud of every single child who took part and who stepped up for and loved the challenge and excitement of the day. Undoubtedly, this experience will have instilled confidence and the belief that anything is possible.

This opportunity could not have happened without the support of the school staff and volunteers. Thank you, sincerely, to Mrs Best – who leads music in our school and who has led on Young Voices since September – with the able help on the day of Mrs Dinsdale and Mrs Amor. It was a very long day and our volunteers who committed to this deserve huge thanks; we appreciated their time and care greatly and could not have managed the trip without them – Paula Tew, Jo Blair, Louise Slowgrove, Rebecca Holmes, Vivika Houston and Francesca Gulso Gallisai.

The coaches did not return to school until after midnight, and this caused great hilarity to be in school on a Saturday. The parents who travelled to watch the performance were also buzzing with the whole extravaganza – not knowing what to expect. The performance, with the children's choir and guest artists - which included Heather Small (from M People), Urban Strides, The Beatbox Collective and Anna Phoebe was simply outstanding. We have received some lovely emails of appreciation and we are grateful for these, but please know that being able to provide this opportunity for the children comes with a huge amount joy for us, too. Thank you to everyone who made the day possible – let's do it again, in two years' time!


Mobile Phones

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YOUNG VOICES 2023



On Friday, 70 children, 4 teachers and 6 willing (brave!) parent volunteers made their way on two coaches up to Birmingham to take part in Young Voices 2023. The journey there was smooth and we even managed to navigate a toilet and snack stop at the services half way. Finally, we arrived and, together with over 6000 other children, filed into the arena and were amazed at just how big it was!

Then it was time to rehearse. The children knew their words and music really well and listened attentively to the conductor throughout - not an easy thing to do for 3 hours straight! At 5pm we were allowed to have our tea, the children were really sensible with their food and made sure they hadn't eaten everything by lunch time! It was a 2 hour wait between the rehearsal and concert and we were so impressed with the children - some chose to have a little rest, some read

and some still had the energy to sing some more and chant support for Newbridge!

Then it was the moment we had all been waiting for... the concert began. The lights, sounds and atmosphere were absolutely electric - 'CRAZY' according to Zelda! Some of the children were a little overwhelmed at the start, however with some reassurance and support from the staff they **all** began to fully immerse themselves in the experience. Although



we couldn't see that far, we knew our amazing parent supporters were in the audience cheering us on. The concert sped by - we were all blown away by the talent of the beatboxers, solo singers and incredible violinist! The look on the children's faces was priceless and seeing them singing their hearts out, jumping and cheering made all the organising, planning and music learning more than worth it.

On the coach home, probably half the children went to sleep and we had a peaceful journey. We arrived back at 12.15am Saturday morning and all had a giggle that we were in school on a Saturday! Parents were brilliant and all the children were collected promptly, meaning the teachers and parent volunteers could finally get home to bed! WHAT an experience - one that the children and I wont forget in a hurry. One last thing to mention is that **all** of the children were extremely well-behaved throughout and we were so proud of how they represented Newbirdge Primary School. A recount of the day at Young Voices by Thomas B, in Class 30G

On Friday the Newbridge choir went to Young Voices 2023 at the Birmingham Arena. It was an extraordinary day! I went with Mabel, Lyla, Olivia, Emma, Freya and Amelie from 30G.

Young Voices is the biggest school choir in the world with over four thousand schools taking part. Between January and February five different arenas host several Young Voices concerts, each featuring the school choirs and other acts. At the one we went to there were over six thousand children singing together, as well as Heather Small from M People, beatboxers, a rockstar with a violin and a backing band. A conductor guided us through the night by telling the singers what to do by waving a stick and using his hands to make us go louder and quieter.



At 10am the Newbridge choir of 70 children got on two

coaches which would take us to Birmingham, a three hour journey. Everyone was excited about the trip. We didn't really know what to expect. I just thought it would be like Wembley Stadium without a football pitch but with lots of people instead.

When we got there we were amazed how big the Arena was. It was round and had lots of coloured lights including the Young Voices logo. There were already quite a lot of other schools there, but it still felt pretty empty. We found our seats and practised for three hours and then it was time for dinner which we ate in our seats. We also came up with our own cheer, "Newbridge Primary, Newbridge Primary!"

By 7pm the Arena was full of the families coming to watch their children. It was so busy we couldn't work out where the Newbridge supporters were but we knew they were there somewhere watching. Suddenly, it went all dark and everyone cheered! The children were so excited! Then the lights came up on the stage and some performers started singing and dancing about an astronaut and then they welcomed the principal conductor onto the stage. Our first song was 'Over the Hills' and everyone cheered. It was an amazing experience to sing with so many other children in such an incredible venue. More and more songs followed, some with the school choir and some without. It felt like a real pop concert! My favourite act was the beatboxers. Beatboxing is making sounds with your mouth that sound like real things like switching something on, or musical instruments, or making fart sounds, which everyone thought was very funny. They even got the audience involved.

When the night was over we found our way to our coach and most people fell asleep on the way home. We got back to school at midnight and our parents were waiting. We said, 'Good morning Newbridge' as we went home. We'd had the best day ever!


Our School Library

Should I keep my

child off school?



Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19.
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics



but make sure you let their school or nursery know about...

Hand, foot and mouth	Glandular fever
Head lice	Tonsillitis
Threadworms	Slapped cheek
