Those who are late after 9.10am are marked as Unauthorised (U). The school gates close at 8.53am.

Warm weather safety


Please ensure that your child has a filled water bottle every day, and on warmer days, a hat and sun cream applied before school.





















The children have been super and we are so impressed with the letters they have written. Some have managed to persuade their parents to purchase such things as swings, slides, pets and gymnastic bars.
