Changes to guidance for managing COVID-19 in education and childcare settings

Please find the revised guidance, as sent out earlier this week, following the cessation of free access to Covid-19 testing for the majority of the population.

When to come into school:

- Children with mild symptoms such as a runny nose, sore throat, or mild cough, who are otherwise well, can continue
 to attend their education or childcare setting.
- Children and young people who usually attend an education or childcare setting and who live with someone who has a positive COVID-19 test result, should continue to attend as normal.

When to stay at home:

- Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and where possible avoid contact with other people. They can return to the education or childcare setting when they no longer have a high temperature and they are well enough.
- Positive COVID-19 test result if a child or young person has a positive COVID-19 test result they should try to stay
 at home and where possible avoid contact with other people for 3 days after the day they took the test. The risk of
 passing the infection on to others is much lower after 3 days, if they feel well and do not have a high temperature.
- Where there is a confirmed or suspected case of an infectious illness, education settings can take the decision to
 refuse a child if, in their reasonable judgement, it is necessary to protect other children and staff from possible
 infection.

Remote Learning no longer required

In line with recent revised guidance, the temporary provisions in the Coronavirus Act 2020 expired on 24th March 2022, and, as a result, schools are no longer required to provide any form of remote learning for pupils who are absent with either a positive COVID-19 test or because they are unwell with respiratory illness symptoms.





















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
