Lesson 1	We are learning to identifying the key features of a landscape	The horizon line is where the sky meets the ground.		Focus on composition, children to consider where to place the horizon within their artwork, inspired by Vincent Van Gogh		
Lesson 2	We are learning to explore different textures	Various textures can be made by using different materials to show how things feel when touched.		Children use a range of materials, from cardboard to foil, to replicate the textures found in landscapes		
Lesson 3	We are learning to paint using different tints and shades.	Different tints are made by adding white to colours to lighten them.		Using watercolours, children create different tints and shades to paint the background of their landscape		



Lesson 4	We are learning to reproduce and apply an artists' colour range to our own work	Vincent Van Gogh is one of the most famous past impressionist painters. He was from the Netherlands.	Over the top of their textured background, children add colour using poster paints to complete their pictures.		
Lesson 5	We are learning to create details using controlled painting and other materials and objects	Drawing darker pencil marks to show darker tones is called shading.	Children add objects to their landscape and images with added detail and shading
