Dear Parents/Carers,

WOW! What a week with so many achievements to **celebrate.** Our children **continue** to **achieve significantly above the national averages** (nat ave) for 2024 (2025 national data isn't released until the Autumn term). **74%** of reception pupils achieved a **Good Level of Development** (67% nat ave 2024). In the **Y1 Phonics Screening Check**, a phenomenal **92%** met the standard (80% nat ave 2024) and **100%** of the Y2 resits met the standard. **68% of Y4s achieved 25/25 in the Y4 Multiplication Tables Check results** (34% nat ave 2024). **KS2 SATS results** will be published on **8th July**.

Last week, our school celebrated **National Refugee Week**, a time to honour the **strength**, **creativity**, **and resilience** of people who have been **forced** to **flee** their homes. Mrs Osborne shared the theme for 2025, *"Community as a Superpower,"* in a whole school assembly and reminded us that when we come together, we can create **spaces of safety**, **belonging** and **hope**. Throughout the week, pupils explored what it means to be part of a **community**—whether that's through **sharing stories**, learning about **different cultures**, or simply offering a **smile** to someone new. We discovered that small acts of kindness, when multiplied, can become a powerful force for good.

Y1-Y3 accessed a virtual author event with **Patricia McCormick** and **Mevan Babakar**. **'The Bicycle' inspired** pupils to put their **creativity** and **compassion** into action as they wrote heartfelt class **poems**. While those in Years 4, 5 and 6 thoughtfully created **class pledges** inspired by the work and writing of **A M Dassu**. These inspiring pieces will be proudly displayed in our Wellbeing Pod, now featuring a newly developed **Refugee Area** complete with a tent to help **foster empathy** and **understanding**.

In September, **Mr Horkan** became our new computing lead, and he hit the ground running with a mission to put our school on the **computing map**. In January, he gathered an **enthusiastic** group of **Year 6** pupils who **dedicated** their Tuesday evenings to an exciting new adventure: **VEX robotics**. Throughout the year, this team learned how to **design**, **build**, and **code robots** while tackling real-world challenges—like climate change—through a series of **problem-solving tasks**. All their hard work led up to the VEX Robotics Competition at **Nissan** in Sunderland last week.

Accompanied by Mr Horkan and Mrs Cowan, our team entered the event with hopes of **learning** and having **fun**, since it was Oakdene's very first time **competing** against 14 North East schools. But the Year 6s **exceeded** all expectations—**dominating** every challenge up until the final round! They achieved a very respectable **2nd place** and received additional **robotics kit** to grow our collection and **skills** for next year. The VEX Robotics pathway opens the door to competitions on a local and regional level, with opportunities to reach the UK National Championships—and even the World Championships. We couldn't be prouder of what our **young engineers** have already achieved.



Childcare



12 May stakeholder mini-toolkit

From September 2025, eligible working parents will be able to access 30 hours of funded childcare a week, for 38 weeks of the year, starting from the term after their child turns 9 months old until they begin school.

On Monday 12 May, all eligible working parents of children who will be at least nine months old on or before 31 August will now be able to apply for their 30 hours childcare. This marks an important milestone in the lead-up to the full rollout in September, when working parents will gain access to the final stage of the working parent entitlement.

The Department for Education is marking this milestone with a range of activity to promote the working entitlements to parents, reminding them to get their code and to visit <u>www.childcarechoices.gov.uk</u> to find out more about the support available to them.

Autumn term 2025
