CLIFTON SUSPENSION BRIDGE

in 1829, a competition took place for engineers to design a bridge. This bridge had to cross the Avon Gorge, connecting Bristol and Somerset, while still allowing tail boats to reach the docks. The winner of this competition was a famous engineer called Isambard Kingdom Brunel

The building of the Clifton Suspension Bridge began on 21st June 1831.



Unfortunately, the builders ran out of money before they could finish the bridge. Bo, at first, people had to cross by getting in a basket suspended by a rope - underneath an iron bar

The bridge is still open today, and vehicles have to pay a toil of £1 to access it. Every day, around 8,800 vehicles cross the bridge

On 15 September 1259 Brunel died. The engineers working with him decided that finishing the bridge was the best memorial they could give him. As luck would have it, his other bridge, the Hungerford Buspension Bridge, was to be demoilshed, meaning they could use the strong iron chains on the Olifion Suspension Bridge. On the Sth December 1964, it was finally open to the public, measuring 412m in total length!

How to build a Frog Pond! By Jesse Morrissey 58



<u>Requirements</u>

You will need:

- An area of your garden
- Some large rocks
- Some builders' sand or gravel
- A variety of pond plants
- Pond liner (preferably made with butyl rubber)
- Rainwater
- A spade

<u>Location</u>

Pick a spot with both sunlight and shade. Plan on building the pond in a location that is about 70% covered by shade. A good place to build a pond is partially underneath the shade of a tree. Sunlight keeps the pond warm while shade prevents the frogs and their water from drying out. (Build underneath a deciduous plant like an oak and maple trees. The tree will lose its leaves in the fall so the pond receives full sunlight in the winter, preventing it from freezing).

Size

Sizes for frog ponds vary so if you are going to make a small frog pond then use something like a kitchen sink* if you are going to dig a pond then you might want to go up to 1.5 meters. (We will mainly be focusing on digging a pond)
