A fresh, irresistible rom-com.




Library Event: The Excelsion Award

Modern day kids, Annie and Nico, travel back in time to the Great Pyramids in Egypt, the Great wall of China and also learn all about oil, from origins to present day.




Star Cat: a turnip in time by James Turner and Yasmin Sheikh

Join the crew of the Star Cat as they take part in a science competition, judge a plant show, and explore a planet of sentient poos!




Groot: UPROOTED by Dan Abnett, Lee Garbett and Damian Couceiro

Library Events Multi Culture Club

In the Multi-Culture Club, we believe that fashion is not just about aesthetics; it is a form of expression, a way to honour our roots, and a bridge that connects us across borders

and boundaries.

Through our expression of fashion and dress, we are learning how every outfit is a story waiting to be told, and every accessory is a piece of history waiting to be discovered.

Each week, our members bring in an article of clothing that represents their culture. It has been fascinating to see the similarities across the diverse style of clothing.

Emaan brought an traditional Pakistani outfit she wore for a wedding. The *lehenga* is a three-piece garments which traditionally includes a long skirt that typically reaches down to the ankles. It can be worn with a long or short embellished top in complementary colours, and the *dupatta*, which is like a scarf or shawl. This style is prevalent in South Asian culture and usually worn on special occasions and celebrations.

Aryanna brought in her bolero, a variation of the *Philippineana*, which is a traditional outfit. for women in the *Philippines*. It is known for its butterfly sleeves. The material is very delicate and we really appreciate Aryanna for modelling it for us!
