Me, In Between By Julya Rabinowich When her family seek asylum in Europe, Madina faces the struggles of displacement and feeling caught between her old and new life.




No Country By Joe Brady In a Britain where civil war is raging, a family try to live as normal a life as possible while planning to escape overseas.

Carnegies

The Yoto Carnegies are the UK's longest running and best-loved children's book awards, recognising outstanding reading experiences created through writing and illustration in

books for children and young people. Our reading group has been taking part as 'shadowers' as they 'shadow' the judging process for the Yoto Carnegie Medals; they read, discuss and review the books on each shortlist, engage in reading related activity which they can share online. This month, the Shadowers voted for their favourite books this month to win the Shadower's Choice Medal.

Lauren voted for, "The Door of No Return", shows the accurate but beautifully portrayed reality of what it is like in deprived places. Grace voted for, "The Song Walker" because she enjoyed the character building.

It was a strong tie between The Door of No Return and Away with Words in our reading group.

The winner of the Yoto Carnegie Shadowers' Choice Medal for Writing is Tia Fisher for her powerful debut novel told in verse, Crossing the Line.

Based on a true story about teenagers swept up into county lines, this 'innovative and engaging' story shows the power of poetry to convey difficult truths in a way that engages and excites young minds.

For the first time, the Yoto Carnegie Medal for Writing is awarded to a Black British author, and the current Children's Laureate – Joseph Coelho – for his "beautifully descriptive" novel in verse The Boy Lost in the Maze illustrated by Kate Milner (Otter-Barry Books). The story portrays a boy's journey into manhood and "cleverly integrates" the ancient legacy of the Minotaur with the contemporary journey of a teenager searching for his biological father.









Library Events AROUND THE WORLD & MULTICULTURAL FESTIVAL
