
We also curated selections for Halloween and Black History Month, showcasing spooky tales, classic horror, and notable works by Black authors.

Punching the Air by Ibi Zoboi and Yusef Salaam After a sixteen-year-old American boy is convicted of a crime he didn't commit and sent to prison, he struggles to find a way to keep true to himself.

Powerful, lyrical tale of systemic racism and the redemptive quality of art.



Windrush Child by Benjamin Zephaniah A young Jamaican boy arriving in Britgin with his pare

A young Jamaican boy arriving in Britain with his parents in the late 1940's tries to make the best of things despite of the racism he encounters.

A timely novel which encapsulates the tragedy of the WR generation.



When Our Worlds Collided by Danielle Jawando Three teenagers are brought together when they witness a fatal attack on a 14-year-old boy and have to contend with institutional racism in the aftermath.

Individual stories of the three compelling central characters weave together & reflect on

big issues of race, prejudice, class & friendship. Thought provoking & sobering read



You Think You Know Me by Ayaan Mohamud

Drawing on her own experiences of Islamophobia, Ayaan shines a light on the lives behind the headlines, in a story of how a racist attack leads one girl to speak up. A compelling exploration of many issues in an authentic and vivid voice, and a welcome spotlight on British-Somali life. Tense and at times raw, there are snatches of humour and fun.


The Horrors of Dunwick Farm by Dan Smith Three friends try to uncover the truth when a mysterious plane crash sets off an unsavoury sequence of events.




We enjoyed a Not-so-Spooky Story Time, where dived into eerie tales perfect for the season.

Pupils then shared their mini horror stories and two lucky winners got a little treat. Check out some of the best entries.










