
Librarian Recommendations



Library Events FIRST ANNUAL POETRY SLAM

We held our first **Annual Poetry Slam** this month. The theme for this year was **diversity**. Our students shared their original poems and performed poems from their favourite poets. The purpose of this event is to provide a space for students to develop their emerging skill with poetic forms, especially spoken word poetry. Spoken word poetry differs from other, more traditional, forms of poetry in that it is meant to be read aloud with elements of performance adding to the meaning of the piece.



We enoyed performances from 5 pupils: Elizabeth H, Y7; Rosie R and Penny O, Y8; Jenna O, Y10; Rhiannon N, Y11. Poems by Maya Angelou, Gwendolyn Brooks, and original poems by our pupils featuring topics of feminism, politics, and racism. Students were excited to discuss the different issues that fall under the umbrella of celebrating our differences, from personal experience or those less privileged, the insight into the minds of these young people was inspiring.

We were joined by two special guests in the audience,
Headteacher Mrs Wilkinson and Chair of Governors, Mr Lee.
As the discussion turned to freedom, Mrs Wilkinson took the opportunity to invite everyone to share their views on the school rules. Harrison D especially appreciated this, stating, "Mrs Wilkinson is a wonderful Head Teacher because she listens to us." Mr Lee thanked the group for their performances and expressed that he would love to join us again.

Current Events

Scientists have been observing the Earth's land, atmosphere, ocean, and ice. They believe ithat Earth's climate is getting warmer, which will impact the Earth's plants and animals.

Stopping climate change is possible, but time is running out. According to a new report released by the United Nations (U.N.) on the 4th of April, 2022. The report states that he world's top climate scientists say that countries must sharply reduce their fossil-fuel emissions in the next few years. Otherwise, the dangers of global warming—including droughts, wildfires, and ecosystem loss—will become much worse.

"This is a climate emergency," U.N. Secretary-General, António Guterres says. Not following the guidelines, he says, puts "us firmly on track toward an unlivable world."

The earth is now 1.1°C warmer than it was at the start of the industrial revolution. We are not on track to meet agreed targets in the 2015 Paris Agreement on climate change, which set a goal of keeping global temperature increase well below 2 °C or at 1.5 °C above preindustrial levels. More than 100 countries agreed to cut methane emissions by 30% this decade. Methane is a planet-warming gas. More than 130 pledged to stop deforestation within that time. Trees are important to the health of the planet. They help clean the air and guard against climate change. They're also a source of food and medicine. But 46% of the world's trees have been cut down.



Technology for renewable energy, such as solar and wind power, has gotten better, and cheaper. Planting the right trees is part of the solution. Using green and clean energy will also help create more jobs, improving world economics. Small changes can make a difference, too. Try switching to energy-saving lightbulbs, walking instead of using the car,

turning off electrical items when you're not using them, recycling and reducing your food waste can help the Earth. And the easiest way to save the Earth is by learning more about the environment and sharing your knowledge with others.
