


All That's Left in the World By Eric J. Brown



After teenagers develop the ability to grow plants from their skin, recruits hired by an energy corporation must learn to use their powers to help fight climate change.



#### The Light in Everything

The book is detailed, with different perspectives to show you how the characters deal with situations and how they feel. However, I thought this book was dry sometimes. It pulled me in the first few chapters but it did take me a few tries to keep on reading. The book starts off with Zofia's dad and Tom's mum having a baby, so they have to move into Zofia's little cottage near the sea together. But, they don't like each-other. Their personalities clash, and they can't stand one another. The book shows you how their relationship blooms. Sadly, I felt like the ending was predictable. I would recommend this book to readers of all ages.

#### When Shadows Fall

A poignant story of the protagonist, Kai, and how he copes with his difficult teen years. The novel explores difficult topics such as loss and agony, it shows how easy it is to lose the things that are significant to you. It is such a heart-rending and touching plot, the author skilfully combines graceful poetry with discordant problems with families. I adored the illustrations and how it gorgeously portrays the emotions of the characters, it explores the relevance of friendship and family. However, it can be quite confusing and difficult to grasp the plot, but I definitely recommend it to people who enjoy empathetic and uplifting stories.


#### Needle


