



Before the world knew them as Alexander Hamilton and Elizabeth Schuyler, young Alex and Eliza fell in love amid the turmoil of the American Revolution.








BOOKS WITH NO ROMANCE TO READ AS AN ANTIDOTE TO VALENTINE'S DAY




But Sera is courageous, so she will find the missing children and bring back







Library Events

Some of the fantastic projects were donated to the library, and we have gained our Reading Robot mascot. Stop by the library to check out the incredibly creative creations.




