# 'Speak Up!' Speeches by young people to empower and inspire by Adora Svitak

Greta Thunberg's condemnation of climate crisis apathy and Malala Yousafzai's heartfelt call to keep girls in education are just two of the 45 stirring speeches to feature in this absorbing book. The first ever collection of speeches made by children and teenagers around the world, it shows that today's young people are a force to be reckoned with. At the age of 12, author Adora Svitak gave a TED Talk entitled "What adults can learn from kids" and she writes in her introduction: "I'm delighted to present a small sample of the many brilliant young minds worldwide who are proof that we have much to learn from the 42 per cent of the world's population under the age of 25."

#### 10 Interesting Word Facts:

- 1. Alphabet comes from the first two letters of the Greek alphabet: alpha + beta.

- 3. Daisy is a contraction of "day's eye", because the flower opens in the morning and closes at night.
- 4. Deeded is the only word that is made using only two different letters, each used three times.
- 5. Dord is an example of a 'ghost word' non-existent words that appeared in the dictionary because of printing errors.

# **NEW School Reading Programme**

The previous issue explained the new reading programme we will be introducing to pupils across the school. In case you missed it, we have included the information again below. The Accelerated Reader is a programme to foster a life-long love of reading, monitor pupils' reading, recommend books aimed at the right reading level, assess pupils' progress and also give pupils access to hundreds of digital books for free!

Our Lady & St Bede Catholic Academy are taking part in a pilot using Accelerated Reader along with a number of Primary and Secondary schools across the Bishop Hogarth Trust, with the aim to encourage pupils, and given them regular opportunities, to read.

There are three parts to the programme:

- Star Reading
- myON by Renaissance
- Accelerated Reader

Members of staff are currently undergoing training and preparing our computers and library. Pupils will be completing their Star Reading Assessment this term and the complete package for Accelerated Reader will be up and running for all pupils by September.

## Accelerated Reader - What is it? How will my child be involved?

#### What is Star Reading $^{TM}$ ?

Star Reading is an online assessment used to determine a child's English reading level. It is a computer-based reading assessment program that uses computer-adaptive technology. Questions continually adjust to each child's responses. If the response is correct, the difficulty level is increased. If they cannot answer a question, or answer incorrectly, the difficulty level is reduced. The test uses multiple-choice questions and

takes approximately 20-30 minutes.



#### What is myON by Renaissance™?

myON is a digital classroom resource containing thousands of digitised books in English language with audio tracks to help scaffold reading & understanding in English.

Books are recommended for each pupil by their grade level, and either their integrated Star Reading ZPD score, or from a short Lexile assessment within the website. This ensures that all children have a personalised reading experience based on their ability.





#### What is Accelerated Reader™ (AR)?

AR is a computer program that helps teachers manage and monitor a child's independent reading practice. Children pick either a physical book that falls within their ZPD level or choose to read from the recommended myON digital library. When they have finished reading, they take a short quiz on the computer - passing the quiz is an indication that the


child has understood what has been read. If they are reading at the recommended level for them, then most children are likely to be successful and enjoy the books and quizzes. Best of all they learn and grow at their own pace.

What is a ZPD (Zone of Proximal Development)? A ZPD is the range of books that will challenge a child without causing frustration or loss of motivation. Each child will receive

a ZPD, or reading range, after taking a Star Reading test. It is important for children to read with a high degree of comprehension and within their ZPD.

#### What is a Lexile Measure?

A Lexile Measure is produced within myON from an initial Lexile Placement exam taken by a child, followed by regular shorter Benchmark exams to continue to refine it as they read more books. It is a range personalised to each child and reported as a single figure which covers 100 points below and 50 points above. Lexile data is also calculated from the Star Reading test and will display in myON if Renaissance products are integrated.



#### What are Book Levels & Lexile Levels?

Both are ways of matching children to suitable books. All books in myON, and all books with an Accelerated Reader quiz have been levelled based on difficulty of the text to enable a quick match to

quiz nave been levelled based on altticulty of the text to enable a quick match to children who should be able to read & understand them.


Book levels are reported using the ATOS<sup>™</sup> readability formula range from 0.1–20.0. Lexile levels range from BR 300L – 1450L.

#### How can I help my child using Renaissance?

As with anything, reading and understanding English language improves with practice. According to Renaissance research, children who read at least 20 minutes a day and achieve a 90% comprehension rate on AR quizzes see the greatest gains. Encourage your child to read at home with myON with the English language audio track, discuss books, and ask questions about what they have read.

#### What are Interest levels & points?

Every book that has an AR quiz is assigned an Interest Level to identify which age group a book is appropriate for, based on the content and themes within the book. These are recommendations only and



parents are recommended to use their best judgement when guiding pupils, especially in myON where books at different interest levels can be found.


Interest Levels	Age
LY—Lower Years	5-8
MY—Middle Years	9 - 13
MY+ - Middle Years Plus	Ages 12+
UY-Upper Years	14+

Each AR quizzed book also has a point value calculated to denote the length & time of the reading experience. AR points are based on the length of the book (number of words). Pupils earn a percentage of points according to how well they pass the quiz.

# How can I find further information?

For Star Reading and Accelerated Reader, each child accesses a specific website set up for a school or educational institute; and the teachers or educators will be able inform you about your child's progress.




## '29 Locks' by Nicola Garrard

A coming-of-age novel set in contemporary London and Hertfordshire. Fifteen-year-old Donald Leroy Samson is the son of an absentee St Lucian father and a drug-addicted English

mother. Growing up in dire poverty in Hackney, East London, his life is shaped by casual violence, gang initiation, drug-dealing and knife crime. When Donny's bored, rich, white girlfriend Zoe is offered a dubious modelling audition, the couple 'borrow' a barge and navigate the 29 locks on the canal system from Hertfordshire down into Kings Cross.

When they start out on their journey, the future for both of them looks unpromising, like the fake audition, but as each lock is navigated and conquered, as the waters fall then rise again, their adventure takes on a new dimension. Life will never be the same again. A gritty, urban tale of redemption!




### 'Tremendous Things' by Susin Nielsen

# 'The Crossing' by Manjeet Mann


A trailblazing new novel about two teenagers from opposite worlds; The Crossing is a profound story of hope, grief, and the very real tragedies of the refugee crisis.

# 'TheYearbook' by Holly Bourne




# 'Feast of the Evernight' by Alex Wheatle
