# Mrs. Quigley's weekly message:

What a lovely half term we have had in school! This half term we have fully launched our journey into HPL (High Performance Learning) with children learning about and recognising how to demonstrate perseverance. Each half term we will focus on one or two values which will help children to develop themselves. In addition to this, we will be beginning to think about the skills needed to succeed. Next half term we will be talking to the children about meta-cognition - quite simply thinking about thinking. We will be teaching the children how they are already doing this a lot of the time, but also how to use this when facing challenges. Our HPL Ambassadors are now leading weekly certificate assemblies and are currently designing our mascots to support us learning about the different values, skills and how/when we can use this. They will be sharing this with the children and families after the half term. I have had a sneak peak and can confirm they have done an amazing design job! Our vision for HPL is that it will support all children to have the belief 'everyone can' succeed.

Next half term we will have Parents Evening and teachers will be able to share with you successes and next steps for your child. I will also be asking parents to complete a short survey so we can gain some of your feedback for different things we are working on. If you haven't yet booked your appointment, please do so as soon as possible. If you do have any feedback in the meantime, please remember you can contact your child's class teacher via Seesaw or at pick up time, and I am on one of the entrance gates most days.

Finally, next half term we will be displaying our PAN art work at the Gateway in town. This will be on show from Thursday 22 February to Thursday 7 March, so please do visit if you can. It is a lovely presentation of lots of collaborative and creative learning that all children across school have contributed towards.

#### **Picture News**

The Picture News topic for after half term is ...

'Should we learn sign language at school?'



Pupils in England will have the choice to take a GCSE exam in British Sign Language (BSL) from 2025. BSL is a form of communication using hand gestures and other movements. Pupils, who take the subject, will learn around 1000 different signs. Fairfield High School (pictured in this week's poster) already runs a successful extracurricular club in response to pupils' interest in learning BSL.

British Sigh Language (BSL) is a form of communication that uses hand gestures and movements. For the new GCSE qualification in BSL, students will learn about the history of BSL and how it evolved into the language it is today. The GCSE assumes no prior knowledge of BSL but will be accessible for students who use it as their first language.

Things to talk about at home:

- \* Have you ever used sign language or seen it being used by others?
- Is sign language a language you would like to learn? What do you think are some of the advantages of learning sign language?
- \* Are there any other skills or subjects you believe would be useful to learn at school?

#### Parentpay WBC Year End

It is very important that all Parentpay dinner/snack accounts are not in arrears on Friday 31 March. This is the final day of Warrington Borough Council's financial year. Thank you to everyone who does keep their accounts updated, it is a big help.

Please remember, there is no credit offered for meals and funds should be available on Parentpay at the point where your child orders a snack or meal.

There are a number of ways to keep your accounts up to date:

- by checking funds each time your child orders a meal or snack
- by setting up email (free) or text (charges applicable) reminders for the maximum amount your child would spend in a day (eg if they have a meal, 2 toast and a drink, it should be set at £3.45, if it is just a meal, toast and drink it would be £3.20)
- by setting up an auto top up (if you do chose this option, to stop the account going into arrears, the top up should be set at the maximum amount that your child would use in one day)

If you need any help to set up the reminders or top up, please contact Kate in the school office.

For information, snacks cost 25p per slice of toast, crumpet or piece of fruit, 30p for milk and 35p for juice, lunches cost £2.60. This means £5 will not cover 2 days of lunch.

As mentioned, it is important that Parentpay accounts are not in arrears at the end of March because of WBC's year end. If you are having any difficulties making payments, please let us know as we can only help if we are aware of a problem. Thank you.

#### Parking Issues Update—Police Scheme

Cheshire residents are now able to **report public illegal parking problems online** after a trial project in Crewe was given the green light to be rolled out across the county.

Operation Park Safe is a project which allows members of the public to report parking issues online through the Cheshire Police website.

Residents can upload videos and photographs of offending vehicles to the website where they will be assessed by an experienced traffic officer, who will triage and deal with any dangerous parking offences. Any minor traffic obstructions or community impact issues will be allocated to the local PCSO or Beat officers to deal with.

#### What residents will need to do:

- You will need to provide a written statement about the offence, including the date and time it happened
- You will need to provide us with your name, address, date of birth, and contact details
- You may be required to attend court if the matter is contested
- Do NOT challenge the driver or get involved in confrontation, Do NOT put yourself at risk to obtain a photograph

#### What officers will do:

The Roads and Crime Unit will triage the report and will deal with the person responsible. This may include issuing fines or educational courses depending on the severity of the offence committed.

#### Offences officers will deal with:

- Vehicles parked on or in a crossing area: This includes the area covered by zig-zag lines
- Parking on white lines: People cannot stop or park on a road marked with double white lines, even when a broken white line is on your side of the road, except to pick up or set down passengers, or to load or unload. This includes the pavement or verge
- Forcing pedestrians to walk in the road: This includes parking on the pavement where there is not enough room for pedestrians to get past
- Parking at/on a junction: Vehicles cannot stop, park opposite or within 10m of a junction
- School parking offences: People cannot stop or park on the zig-zag lines or keep clear markings
- Parking on a cycle track
- Parking a goods vehicle on the road: Vehicles
  with a maximum laden weight of more than 7.5
  tonnes (including trailers) cannot park on a verge,
  pavement, or any land situated between
  carriageways, without police permission, unless
  this is essential for loading/unloading, but the
  vehicle cannot be left unattended

#### What officers can't deal with:

- Single / double yellow line offences: These are local authority parking enforcement only
- Pavement parking: where there is still room for pedestrians to get past without having to go into the road

Children and staff have been busy with lots of mental health and Wellbeing activities across the week.




