

So you want to be a Doctor?

Real-life stories - work experience

Find some real-life stories below written by current doctors about their work experience.

Lizzie Cottrell, NIHR Academic Clinical Fellow and 3rd year GP Specialty Trainee says:

"I undertook a range of work-experience prior to going to medical school including a week's experience at the local community hospital, through school, where I shadowed a number of different doctors and nurses, weekly work experience with a local GP over a number of months and volunteering at a community hospital, speaking to the older patients who were on the ward a long time. I also gained experience of the hospital environment through paid work as a hospital domestic at the weekends from the age of 16 years old, making teas and cleaning the ward.



All of this experience was useful, but I would definitely recommend that students do not just shadow a consultant or GP prior to attending medical school, but also do some work experience that lets you really get chance to talk to patients.

I think that the risk of only shadowing senior doctors is that you observe what life may be life a long way down the track and, even then, they do not make you sit through them doing administration and management jobs so you do not get an accurate picture. If you find you don't like talking to patients and/or find this very difficult, then you need to think twice about a career in medicine so using work experience to clarify this, I would say, would be the most valuable experience you could get.

Of all the experience I got, my paid job as a domestic was the best for exposing me to the sights and sounds of a medical environment (many not pleasant!) and gave me plenty of opportunity to learn how to gain rapport with patients."

"Hospitals are a good way of getting a wide variety of experiences, but you need to apply early, as spaces can be limited. Either phone to get the contact you need, or check the internet as often there are application forms available online. Don't expect them to get back to you quickly, and apply to more than one. I couldn't get a space in the hospital so instead I joined their voluntary team, which allowed me to meet lots of doctors, and while talking to them I managed to secure shadowing with a couple of consultants, including going into surgery.

I also managed to get work in an intermediate care home, and so got to see the gritty, less glamorous side of medicine, as well as working with GPs so I could experience both sides of medicine. My advice is if you want to spend time with certain specialists there is no harm in phoning the secretaries to see if they would be willing to let you.

Whatever placement you manage to secure though, make the most of it, think of questions to ask the doctors. This way you will have plenty to discuss in both your personal statement and in your interview."

Laura Nohavicka, FY1 Oxford

"My work experience began in Year 10 when I had a week of experience in a care home for adults with learning/developmental difficulties. I also volunteered at a sports club for disabled children weekly and completed a qualification in disabled sports coaching.

When I started sixth form I volunteered as a tea lady at the local hospital. I also attended the MEDSIM course at Nottingham University (approximately £200).

In terms of showing leadership skills etc I was a member of the debate committee, an adult leader at the local Guide unit and I worked part-time."

"I was fortunate enough to be able to shadow an orthopaedic surgeon for one week, and a GP for a second. The two experiences - arguably at opposite ends of the clinical spectrum - really made me realise that medicine is not as glamourous as it is sometimes portrayed in popular culture. Despite these experiences being challenging, they enabled me to speak with a realistic perspective during my interviews, and also were an important part of my decision making process. The work experience also enabled me to probe current junior doctors' experiences in the NHS in the face of massive change. Once again, despite being a somewhat disconcerting process, it enabled me to demonstrate that I understood the challenges facing the NHS and doctors' training when I attended my interviews"

"As a sixth form student I was fortunate enough to have several areas of work experience to talk about in my medical school interview.

I spent a week with a rural GP practice in Somerset, where I learned some important basics about common medical conditions, and gained some knowledge on the structure of the NHS and how GP surgeries are run as businesses. I also spent a week in a hospital in Nairobi. This was a really fascinating experience, and I was able to talk about the differences in healthcare between England and Kenya at my interview. Finally I worked in several part-time jobs before applying to university. Whilst not directly related to medicine, these were a good way of demonstrating responsibility.

My advice to anyone looking for a place as a medical student is to get some general experience of hospital or GP medicine, and to supplement this with something different, so that you stand out at your interview. Good luck!"



The MPCT Way

At the college, students follow a weekly routine of activities and curriculum. This includes vocational and skills training, physical training, military training days, and assessments.

The MPCT curriculum has been designed to develop our student's physical fitness, essential skills, and self-confidence. The academy operates a 'roll on, roll off' joining process with no set deadline by which to apply, allowing new recruits to join on a weekly basis.

Physical Training

You will be expected to participate in physical training every day at MPCT. This makes up for 50% of the course at MPCT, and will support learner preparation and progression into the military. Being fit and healthy is an essential part of military life and civilian employment. Daily physical training helps you to concentrate and focus during lessons, and you'll become more physically and mentally robust.

Alternative careers for law students

Whilst a law degree is the perfect course for a legal career there are also many other professional sectors and job roles you could consider with the qualification. Whether you've already graduated, are looking for a career change, or are studying law and undecided on your future, we cover some of the potential careers for law graduates below.

Introduction to non-traditional legal careers

For many people, a law degree is seen as the first step to becoming a barrister or solicitor. However, there are many more roles – both within the legal profession and beyond – where a law degree could be extremely useful.

Consider the skills you gain throughout your degree. You'll develop your critical thinking and problem solving skills, become a great communicator, and have excellent research skills and attention to detail. These aren't attributes exclusive to a lawyer. There are many businesses, industries and organisations which could benefit from such skills, meaning there is no end to alternative careers for law students.

Benefits of pursuing alternative careers

There are several benefits to pursuing an alternative career. You'll find more diversity in the job market. You could also find a job which aligns with your personal interests or where your advanced skillset can make a difference. Working for a cause you support or an industry you admire could lead to more job satisfaction. You'll also build on your skills, develop new ones and showcase your adaptability. All of these are desirable assets to employers.

Alternative careers for law students

You'll find some alternative careers are more closely linked to the legal field than others. For some law graduates an alternative career could simply mean avoiding the courtroom or huge legal firms, for others it might mean looking further afield.

Consultancy

A consultant is a specialist in a particular field or area, offering their expertise and knowledge to clients. With your legal knowledge you could support a range of businesses and organisations who may need legal advice from time to time but can't justify an in-house legal team. Moreover, consultancy isn't limited to legal work. You'll find consultants in business, IT, finance, HR, marketing, recruitment and many more.

You could find roles with consultancy firms or work independently. You'll also find some consultancy firms offer graduate schemes. For more information you can take a look at our blog on the benefits of consultancy work.

Accountancy

If you've got a keen eye and like to pay attention to detail then working as an accountant could be perfect for you. There are many roles within accounting across a range of industries, from supporting organisations and businesses to investigating fraud and financial misconduct, so further research is needed if this is something you're interested in. You'll potentially need further qualifications accredited by a professional body too, however there are many opportunities for recent graduates and work based learning schemes.

Policing and law enforcement

If your degree has left you with a passion for helping people and upholding the law, a career in policing or law enforcement could be perfect for you.

Policing and law are an obvious fit as the legal knowledge you gained during your degree will allow you to hit the ground running when it comes to a policing career. Your degree will allow you to assess the legalities of situations quickly and potentially aid in calming situations with this knowledge.

There are numerous careers available within policing and you can see specific role requirements on the Joining the Police website.

Journalism

A popular career outside law for law students is Journalism. Your degree will provide you with the critical thinking and analytical skills essential for investigative reporting. You'll already be familiar with the legal world – for example, how legislation is made and how the court system works – so you're in the unique position of being able to write about legal proceedings effectively. Your legal background can also add weight and integrity to your words, a valuable asset, especially in the online landscape of misinformation and fake news.

Politics

Another popular choice for law graduates is to move into government or politics. You'll find many roles in government, on both a local and national level. There are even graduate schemes offered by The Houses of Parliament, which will see you work within either the House of Commons or House of Lords, and the Civil Service Fast Stream, where you'll work with a government department. Whilst these schemes are highly competitive, there are many other graduate schemes and job opportunities available.

Business

Business is a broad term and offers a huge variety of roles, and graduating with the legal skills you'll gain throughout your degree does mean you'll likely find employment within this huge sector. If you're looking to stay closer to your legal roots you could look for work as an in-house lawyer, supporting a business with the legalities of business operation. Even in-house work offers an opportunity to practice in a number of legal areas, from commercial and corporate law to employment law and intellectual property. With business, the opportunities are endless.

Criminology

If you would rather study the causes of crimes and assess the criminal justice system than represent people within it, you could consider a career in criminology

Instead of working for the justice system, you will more likely be working to improve it. Because of this, you will need to be happy handling data, reporting writing and research.

A background in law and criminology will leave you in a strong position to work in several sectors, including public services, legal services and education.

Education

A law degree can also be a good base for a career in education. You could go on to become a teacher or lecturer or choose to work within the administration or management of an education provider. As a law graduate you could also look to work within educational policy, or work with organisations who specialise in legal education and reform.

And more...

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

Top tips for a successful interview

Plan your journey

Allow extra time and plan to arrive at least 15 minutes early. If you are unfamiliar with the location, do a test run.

Research, research and research!

Be prepared for the interview - research the company and your role.

Appearance

Dress professionally for an interview.

Behaviour

Make sure that you use positive body language, such as a firm hand shake, sit up straight and make eye contact. Don't take your mobile phone into an interview with you.

Sell yourself

Take a record of achievement file with you including your GCSE certificates. You can take notes into your

Before your interview

Practise answering interview questions with someone else. If you are at school or college, you may be able to arrange a mock interview.

Keep in mind the interviewer wants to find out about what you can offer them: the particular skills and qualities you can bring that set you apart from other applicants.

But it's not just about what the employer is looking for – try to think of some insightful questions you could ask, for example:

- Future opportunities for progression?
- Do you have a mentor scheme?
- What responsibilities would I start with if I was successful?
- How soon could I start?

On the day - breathe!

First impressions count!

Make sure you dress appropriately and look the part. Avoid elaborate jewellery, body piercings, excessive make up and hairstyles, etc.

Offer a firm handshake and make appropriate eye contact with the interviewer.

It's OK to take a moment to think through your response, and better to have a considered reply rather than a rushed answer. If you need more time to think about your answer, ask the interviewer to repeat the question. Don't let your nerves take hold of you, channel them and use them to your advantage!

Remember it's not enough to just say you're good at something - always try to provide examples.

It's fine to ask questions! Ask your prepared questions and anything that came up during the interview... Avoid JUST asking about your salary and benefits!

- Tell me a bit about yourself?
- What do you like to do in your spare time? (hobbies etc)
- What is your current situation? (i.e. school, college, employed)
- Have you been given any responsibilities? (i.e. prefect etc)

Why should they hire you...

- What made you apply for this position?
- What do you know about the company?
- What can you bring to the company?
- What skills do you have that will help you in this

Can you give me an example of when...

- You worked as part of a team?
- You used your initiative?
- You worked under a pressure?
- You worked to a deadline?
- You multi-tasked successfully?

Self evaluation...

- What do you consider your strengths?
- What do you consider your weaknesses?
- What is your greatest achievement and why?

Future career plans...

- Where do you see yourself in five years time?
- Have you got a future career in mind?

Starting university is an exciting new chapter

have special educational needs or a disability
(SEND), you might feel uncertain about what to
expect. However, reat assured, UK universities
are dedicated to supporting you every step of
the way. This guide will introduce you to the
resources, adjustments, and services designed
to help you thrive and make the most of your

Peclaring your disability

Your first step towards accessing support
is to declare your disability on your UCAS
application or directly to the university.
Many students worry this might affect their
application, but universities are legally
required under the Equality Act 2010 to treat
everyone fairly. Declaring your disability at

helps universities understand your needs and arrange reasonable adjustments to support your learning and university life from the very beginning.

The Disabled Students' Allowance
If you have additional needs due to a disability,
learning difficulty, or long-term health condition,
you can apply for the Disabled Students'
Allowance (DSA) (page 60). This non-repayable
grant can cover the cost of:

- non-medical helpers, such as a mentor or note-taker travel costs related to your disability specialist equipment, like a laptop with assistive software other resources tailored to your needs.

It's important to apply for the Disabled Students' Allowance (DSA) early, as the process can take some time. While it might seem overwhelming at first, universities are here to guide you through it. At the University of South Wales, for instance, you can connect with a Disablity Adviser during open days, taster assisting or through their dedicated email inbor, even before you enrol. These conversations ensure you have the support you need in place, ready for when you start your university journey.

Quantity surveyor

Quantity surveyors manage all costs relating to building and civil engineering projects, from the initial calculations to the final figures.

As a quantity surveyor (QS), you'll seek to minimise the cost and risk of a construction project and enhance value for money, while still achieving the required legal standards and quality. This includes ensuring statutory building regulations are met.

You'll prepare estimates and costs of the work and when the project is in progress, you'll keep track of any variations to the contract that may affect costs and create reports to show profitability.

Working either for the client or the contractor, in an office or on site, you'll be involved in every stage of a project. Projects include commercial, industrial and residential constructions.

Alternative job titles include construction cost consultant, cost manager and commercial manager.



Your duties will vary depending on whether you're working as a contractor QS or as a consultant QS, also known as a professional or private quantity surveyor (PQS).

As a PQS you'll advise clients from the initial design stage, working out the budget for the job and then putting it out for tender to contractors. The contractor's quantity surveyor will usually be more hands-on, working on site to ensure the project stays within budget, and will liaise with the PQS. Many firms will provide a one-stop-shop from initial design through to completion.

However, as a quantity surveyor, you'll typically need to:

- assist in establishing a client's requirements and undertake feasibility studies to ensure their proposals will work
- prepare and analyse project costings for tenders, such as materials, quantities, labour and time
- prepare tender and contract documents, including bills of quantities with the architect and/or the client
- negotiate contracts and work schedules
- allocate work to subcontractors and oversee their work at all stages of the construction
- perform risk, value management and cost control during construction
- ensure the project remains within budget and on track financially
- undertake cost analysis for repair and maintenance project work
- advise on a procurement strategy
- identify, analyse and develop responses to commercial risks
- provide advice on contractual claims and disputes
- analyse outcomes and write detailed progress reports
- value completed work, oversee bills and arrange payments
- maintain awareness of the different building contracts in current use
- understand the implications of health and safety regulations.

Once you've gained sufficient experience and specialist knowledge, you may also:

- offer advice on property taxation
- provide post-occupancy advice, facilities management services and life cycle costing advice
- assist clients in locating and accessing additional and alternative sources of funding
- enable clients to initiate construction projects
- advise on the maintenance costs of specific buildings
