- Party Political Broadcast (also known, in pre-election campaigning periods, as a party election broadcast) is a television or radio broadcast made by a political party. In the United Kingdom the Communications Act 2003 prohibits political advertising on television or radio; parties are instead allocated broadcast slots (usually around five minutes long) free of charge on broadcast channels using criteria set by Parliament

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Parklands Polling Station Rules

- Political discussion is BANNED in the polling station officials will intervene if they hear discussions which aim to influence other voters.
- You can not make any noise that could disrupt other voters.
 This includes loud discussions, shouting or playing music.
- Voting is a private matter so you MUST be alone when you mark a cross on the ballot paper.
- You MUST NOT put your name on, or sign your voting card or your vote will not count. They are considered rejected ballots because the voter has revealed their identity and breached the rules of a secret ballot.
- You MUST NOT have your mobile phone out and shouldn't be tempted to take any photos in the polling station. This can result in a prison sentence.

- You must attend the correct polling station based on your surname.
- You will need to take your polling card in order to exchange it for a voting card.
 - You must enter the Polling Station in an orderly fashion.
