

The idea of 'British Values' has become an important focus; schools are required to ensure that they promote and raise awareness of this important aspect of citizenship. Read and discuss this article:



British Values

UK Citizenship Test

The Life in the United Kingdom test is a computer-based test constituting one of the requirements for anyone seeking 'Indefinite Leave to Remain' in the UK or naturalisation as a British citizen. It is meant to prove that the applicant has a sufficient knowledge of British life and sufficient proficiency in the English language. The test is a requirement under the Nationality, Immigration and Asylum Act 2002. It consists of 24 questions covering topics such as British values, history, traditions and everyday life.



Can YOU pass the UK Citizenship Test?

Since the latest version of the test was introduced two years ago, the pass rate of 18 out of 24 has plummeted from 85 per cent down to 61 per cent.

Those sitting the £50 test face questions which can be based on any one of an estimated 3,000 facts and 278 dates contained in the government handbook, 'Life in the United Kingdom: A Guide for New Residents.'



What is the purpose of the 'Britishness' test?

Activity: in groups discuss, design and record 5 questions that should be in the Britishness: **Life** in the United Kingdom test.

The following list shows the categories that are considered to make up 'culture'

- 1. <u>History origins and history of Britishness</u>
- 2. <u>Social Status Factors</u> education and occupations
- 3. Language and Communication: Verbal and Nonverbal
- 4. <u>Family Life Processes gender roles, family, etc.</u>
- 5. Beliefs and Practices attitudes and beliefs
- 6. Art and Expressive Forms art, music, stories, dance, etc.
- 7. Diet/Foods preferred food eaten by groups.
- 8. Recreation activities, sports for leisure, etc.
- 9. <u>Clothing</u> types and styles.
