(verb)



To **derive** means to *take*  
or *get* (something) *from*  
(something else);

to trace from a source or  
origin.



The word ***derive*** began  
with two Latin forms...

(it is ***derived*** from Latin!)



**De** = (Latin) down, away

**Rivus** = (Latin) brook or  
stream



This went into Middle  
English as 'to flow from a  
stream'



And into modern English  
as...
