To derive means to take or get (something) from (something else);

to trace from a source or origin.

The word *derive* began with two Latin forms...

(it is *derived* from Latin!)



De = (Latin) down, away Rivus = (Latin) brook or stream



This went into Middle English as 'to flow from a stream'



And into modern English as...
