



Update from the Local Authority

We are seeing an increase in the number of children and staff in schools who are testing positive and we have seen a number of outbreaks. These vary from single cases to sporadic cases in schools but we are also seeing community transmission which is impacting on the number of cases in schools.

It is therefore important that schools, as well as children and families, adhere to the national guidance and advice including any restrictions that may apply in order to keep children, young people and families safe. This means not congregating in large groups outside the school or college and making sure you adhere to the advice on face coverings where appropriate.

It is important that we follow national guidance on the **3 main symptoms**, isolating where necessary and seeking a test. There will be occasions, given we are also approaching winter, when this may not necessarily be Covid related but children will have to isolate – under these circumstances you should follow the same principles as you would if a child had any other infections or colds and remain away from school until they are well enough to return.

Half Term Arrangements

The DfE do not currently have plans to make changes to the autumn half term, including asking schools to stay open for vulnerable children and the children of critical workers, but will keep this under review.

Family and friends can also continue to provide informal childcare as long as groups from different households do not exceed six people, irrespective of where gatherings take place.

The informal childcare exemption came into force on 22 September 2020 and applies only in areas with local lockdown restrictions.

Provision for free schools meals is ordinarily term time only and there is no requirement for schools to continue this provision during school holidays.





Update from the Department for Education

Children aged 11 and over are legally required to <u>wear a face covering on</u> <u>public transport in England</u>, unless exempt for health, age or disability reasons.

In accordance with advice from Public Health England, we recommend that local authorities advise children and young people aged 11 and over to wear a face covering when travelling on dedicated school transport, unless they are exempt. Coronavirus (COVID-19) usually spreads by droplets from coughs, sneezes and speaking. When used correctly, wearing a face covering may reduce the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19) droplets in certain circumstances, helping to protect others.

Schools should support local authorities in promoting the use of face coverings when travelling to and from school, and help them to resolve any issues of non-compliance where appropriate.

The <u>'Hands. Face. Space.' campaign</u> urges everyone to continue to wash their hands, cover their face and make space to control infection rates. The NHS has released a <u>'Hands. Face. Space.' video</u> that may be a useful resource when communicating the importance of wearing a face covering on transport directly to children and young people.

NHS Test & Trace Covid-19 app is available for 16 year olds to download. You must inform a member of staff if you receive a notification during the day that you have been in contact with a positive case. 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Careers

Exciting news from **Medic Mentor** for aspiring doctors! Medic Mentors have teamed with The Queen Elizabeth's Teaching Hospital in Birmingham (UHB) to offer a completely free virtual work experience programme. This will run one Saturday a month for six months, where students will follow the patient journey of three very different patients from initial appointment through to various treatments. As well as observing, students can interact with doctors, asking questions and discussing their observations. Registration opens on October 1st on the Medic Mentor website (<u>https://medicmentor.co.uk/</u>) and the programme will be discussed during the conferences on 3rd and 10th October. Please note: only for aspiring doctors at present, but they are working on something similar for dentists and vets - watch this space!

Career of the Week this week (Chemical Engineer) highlights the fact that females are still massively under-represented in certain STEM careers. This is despite achieving fantastic results in GCSE sciences and maths. Yet the earning potential is huge, and the progression route is varied and interesting. Engineering students are second only to medics in securing full time jobs and earning good salaries. It's well worth checking out the link at the end of the post (even though it's from a couple of years ago - not much has changed!) In polling carried out for Tomorrow's Engineers Week, more boys (+9%) reported being encouraged to think about engineering as a career, particularly by parents and according to a British Gas survey, almost half (48%) of young women do not even consider careers in STEM sectors, citing a lack of STEM knowledge (30%), a perception that the industries are sexist (13%), and a belief that STEM careers are better suited to the opposite sex (9%). NHS Test and Trace COVID-19 app - resources for schools, parents and young people

NHS Test and Trace has launched the <u>NHS COVID-19 app</u>. The app has been launched to help control the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19). It will do this by alerting people who may have been exposed to infection so that they can take action.

The app is available to download on smartphones for anyone aged 16 or over. This means that some students in year 11, students in years 12, 13 and in further education colleges will be eligible to use the app and benefit from its features. In addition to the <u>guidance for schools and further education colleges</u> which we published yesterday, NHS Test and Trace has published <u>guidance and resources to support</u> the use of the app which are available to download.

Schools and further education colleges may find the <u>fact sheet for parents</u> useful.

Another story very close to our hearts here at Parklands is the sad passing of 3 year old Lily Mai Pugh during lockdown. Lily Mai was the sister of Adam and Emma who are currently students here at school. Lily Mai became ill at the start of lockdown and was diagnosed with pleuropulmonary blastoma, a rare chest cancer. It all happened very quickly. Lily Mai's parents have campaigned ever since Lily passed away in July to raise awareness of childhood cancers and the signs and symptoms to look out for. Every two minutes a child is diagnosed, that's approx. 300,000 every year. Sadly, one in five will die. September has been Childhood Cancer Awareness Month and they have already managed to get Chorley Town Hall lit up gold and yellow (the colours associated with the charity).



Today, Friday they have also managed to arrange for Rivington Pike (a place very dear to the family's heart) to be lit up in the same colours in memory of Lily and all other children who have been affected by this awful disease. CDS events who are organising the 'light up' are also putting up a live feed on the night.



This year World Mental Health Day will fall on the 10th October. However, on the 9th October we will be supporting the #HelloYellow campaign run by YoungMinds. We've all been going through a pretty challenging time of late with the local restrictions on our social time, the readjustment to a 'new normal' within schools or the trauma we may have experienced first hand from Covid-19.

To show our solidarity as a school community we will be taking part in the #HelloYellow campaign on Friday the 9th October by wearing something yellow. This can be an item of clothing or something smaller like a badge or bracelet. Looking after our wellbeing has never been more important and too many young people still feel ashamed to open up about how they are feeling. PE kit

Dear parents and carers,

We wrote to you recently regarding PE kit in light of the current situation. This was to help support students and families, as we cannot use the changing rooms.

However, we have noticed an increasing number of students who are exploiting the situation and failing to conform to our expectations. We need to be clear that PE kit is not a fashionable item, it is part of our uniform.

The following are examples of what we have encountered:

- Branded hoodies and tracksuit bottoms (eg Nike, Northface, Under Armour, Adidas).
 The whole idea around uniform is to ensure all students can feel equal at school and not embarrassed if they don't own such expensive sportswear.
- We have had a variety of colours, including pale grey and bright green, which goes against the expectation we set.
- Some students have arrived in inappropriate and fashion leggings.

I am sure you can understand how we are trying to be reasonable and support our community through this pandemic, but we are disappointed that uniform expectations are being regularly breached.

Therefore, from Monday 5th October we expect students to wear:

- Their Parklands blazer every day. This includes PE days;
- Parklands PE shorts. The only exception is if they own Parklands Akoa tracksuit bottoms or Parklands Akoa leggings. Students could also wear navy or black tracksuit bottoms due to the cold weather ideally, unbranded.
- Their Parklands PE top on PE days.
- White socks (ankle or trainer is fine) or Parklands blue football socks on PE days.
- The Parklands Teams or Akoa PE hoodies if they own them. No other hoodies are allowed as the heating is now on in school and rooms are warm.

We also expect/will allow:

- GCSE Dance students to wear their PE or Dance kit when they have PE and Dance on the same day. It is their choice. Both are appropriate.
- Students can bring their own hoodies to PE lessons in their bag when it is cold (PE teachers discretion) and they are outside, which will be throughout the winter months.

We sincerely hope that you can understand the necessity to ensure PE kit has as high a regard as uniform and that breaches of the above rules will result in sanctions, such as isolation or confiscation of items.

We rely on parental support, which will ensure all students in school are treated equally and that no student feels disadvantaged because their family can't afford the latest expensive sportswear.
