Headteacher's Message

Dear parents and carers,

This week has been a busy week for Year 11, with 8 GCSE exams taking place. Next week is also a really packed one, with 9 exams taking place. After that, everyone gets a well earned break before we return on the 2nd June.

Year 7 had a Respect Day yesterday, where they spent the day learning about First Aid and healthy living. The day was finished off with a Zumba session in the hall to demonstrate to the Year 7s how to maintain a healthy heart whilst still having lots of fun! Polite reminder - Uniform and Standards

A big thank you to those pupils and parents who are supporting us to uphold our uniform standards. However, we still have a minority of our pupils who are still not getting it right. Please see below some of the areas which are causing us the most issues;

Pupils' hair colour should be of a natural colour - blue and pink are not natural!

Socks should be black or navy and should not be sports socks.

False nails/nail varnish of any description are not permitted.

Makeup is not allowed nor are false eyelashes. Year 11s may wear discreet makeup.

The only jewellery that is permitted is a watch. All other jewellery will be confiscated until the end of the week.

School will be the final arbiter with regards to uniform and standards. Should any pupil continue to disregard our school policy then further sanctions will be applied.

Y9 and Y11 same day detentions

Please be aware that if your child should receive a **BfL 1 or 0** they will be required to serve a same day detention after school from 3pm until 3.30pm. We hope this sanction may lead to an improved focus and better behaviour in lessons.

We will endeavour to notify you by text message should your child need to attend the detention however please be aware this may not always be possible depending on the time of day. For example, if your child receives a 1 or 0 during their P5 lesson we may not be able to notify you ahead of picking your child up at the end of the day. You can also monitor your child's BFL on the EduLink app under the 'Attendance' section.

On **Friday 23rd May**, following the morning English exam, study leave will begin. Pupils will be free to leave school at **10:45am**, or at **11:10am** for those with extra time. Pupils will then have a week free from exams to rest and prepare for the remaining exams after the half-term break.

From **Monday 2nd June**, pupils will only be required to attend school for their scheduled exams. **Full school uniform** must be worn for all examinations. During this period, a **study room** will be available in the library for any pupils who wish to revise in a quiet space rather than at home. This facility will remain available until the end of the GCSE period on **Friday 20th June**.

If pupils would like last minute guidance or support from their teachers during study leave, they are welcome to attend their **timetabled lessons**, where staff will be present. Some subjects may also offer final **masterclasses** during these sessions. Individual departments will provide further details as needed.

A few important reminders:

- Please arrive by **8:25am** for morning exams and meet in the dining room. You should be on the concourse by **8:45am**.
- Please arrive at **1:30pm** for afternoon exams via the **Southport Road gate entrance** and be on the concourse by **1:45pm**. There is no need to go through reception.
- If you are arriving at school after 9:20am, you must enter via the visitor entrance on Southport Road and go through reception. However, there is no need to sign in at reception.
- If you are in school solely to revise, please sign in at the library when you arrive and sign out when you leave.
- If you are attending a masterclass, please sign in with your teacher.
- **Full school uniform** must be worn at all times while on site. This includes for exams, lessons, and revision.
- The Astley Park gates will be closed by 9:00am and will reopen at 2:50pm each day. If you are arriving or leaving outside of these times, you must use the Southport Road entrance.

Year 10 Boys Football - at home against Holy Cross. What a glorious day for football! The team dominated and won 3-1. Well done!!




<u>Liberia</u> Country of the week

The show is running from Wednesday 28th to Saturday 31st May with Blackpool and Fylde Light Opera Company (BFLOC).



Advice For Parents & Educators

CHOOSE THE RIGHT MODE

Selecting Creative or Peaceful mode allows children to play Minecraft without having to contend with enemies. It's also a great way for you to get used to playing the game with them, since the difficulty level is for lower. This allows you to work togethere on a long-term project, creating something special without the threat of enemies and creatures attacking you or damaging your building.

RESEARCH CONTENT CREATORS

Much of Minecraft's early stages can be an exercise in frustration for players who don't know where to start. Thankfully, there's a wealth of material online and in video format to help you learn the basics. Just be mindful that some of this content may not be appropriate for children, so you should consider watching it yourself first.

HOST A PRIVATE SERVER

The easiest way to find a safe server for children to play on is to make one yourself. Hosting a server prevents strongers from finding it, unless they ve been given its address and password. A private server also lets you control who's allowed to enter and – if necessary – ban anyone who shouldn't be there. This is the closest equivalent to parental controls in Minacraft. Hosting a private server, however, will cost a monthly fee.

2/ TALK ABOUT STRANGERS

At some point in their lives, almost everyone will make contact with a stranger online. Talking to children about online safety, therefore, is essential – as is having a plan for dealing with any hostile or difficult people. It's important that a child knows never to tell a stranger about themselves online and that they should come to you straight away if they do encounter a problem.

PLAY MINECRAFT WITH YOUR CHILD

As a creative building tool, Minecraft makes it great fun for children to team up and construct vast buildings accompanied by imaginative landscapes, much like working with LEGO or model kits. Playing in a game mode that includes enemies can encourage critical thinking and teamwork; however, you should consider which game mode is appropriate for the child in your care.
