Headteacher's Message

Dear parents, carers and students,

We are half-way through this term and you will be receiving a lockdown audit report by Friday 29th January via Edulink in the Documents section, which will give you an overview of engagement with work so far. This will be RAG rated (red, amber, green) and an explanation will be provided alongside the report. You will receive a separate notification on the day the reports are published. In addition to the report, teaching staff have been contacting parents/carers regarding engagement with work, so hopefully there should not be any surprises when the audit reports are published. Please remember that these reports are produced with the best of intentions, and they are a response to feedback we received last year when audit reports were only produced at the end of the half-term.

I expect that school will not reopen after February half-term, but I shall confirm this once the government has made the announcement. Please note that we do not get advance notice from the Department for Education, schools are informed through press releases to the nation.

Attendance of children of critical workers (click here for government guidance)

We have been overwhelmed with the number of requests for places in school for the children of critical workers, so much so that we have had to decline many of the requests. Pupils in school are supervised by teaching staff; the more staff we have in school, the greater the number of teaching groups which are not able to benefit from Google Meet lessons. The children of key workers currently able to attend school will **not** automatically be able to attend after the half-term break. As per government guidelines, children with at least one parent or carer who is a critical worker can go to school or college if required, **but parents and carers should keep their children at home if they can**. Furthermore, the more pupils we have in school, the greater the risk of them catching the virus and passing it on to others. If you are a critical worker and you believe that you <u>absolutely must</u> send your child to school, please email <u>admin@parklandsacademy.co.uk</u>. We will need evidence of your critical worker status (eg ID badge) and an explanation as to why your child cannot work from home. As we have to put a limit on numbers in school, there is no guarantee of a place in school, so please wait for confirmation that you can send your child into school after the half-term break.

Year 11 & their parents/carers - please ensure you read the next two slides regarding exams.

GCSE Exams 2021 - Ofqual Consultation

The Department for Education has confirmed that traditional GCSE exams will not go ahead in summer 2021. We had long suspected this was going to be the case, and since our return in September we regularly informed pupils in assemblies that it was highly likely that teachers would have to submit CAGs (Centre Assessed Grades) to the exam boards.

In light of our experience of last summer, we introduced the concept of WAGs - Working At Grades - to show both students and parents/carers current attainment levels. WAGs have appeared on the students most recent trackers, so there is no excuse for any student to not be aware of their current progress.

WAGs are based on regular, low-stakes assessments in every subject, the frequency of which varies from subject to subject. Year 11s will have completed many such assessments since September, and the trackers therefore show the average grade the students have achieved in the respective reporting period. It is entirely possible for pupils to improve their WAGs but the opposite is also true; it has never been more important for Year 11 to fully engage with their studies, so that teachers have a breadth of evidence upon which to base their CAGs later on in the year. Without evidence, students will not achieve their potential.

The paragraph below is lifted from the Ofqual consultation.

We propose that in summer 2021 a student's grade in each subject will be based on their teachers' assessment of the standard at which the student is performing. In the absence of exams, our view is that teachers, once provided with the necessary guidance and training, are best placed to assess <u>the evidence of the standard at which their student is performing</u>. This consultation seeks views on our proposals, including how to support teachers to make their assessments fairly and consistently. We propose that the final assessment will be made towards the end of the academic year, at about the time students would have taken their exams.

As per the consultation, there will be a few differences to last year, which you need to be aware of:

- 1. Teachers will be asked to submit a grade which best reflects <u>current</u> performance of the students.
- 2. Teachers will not be asked to predict a GCSE grade.
- 3. Teachers will not be asked to take into account what the students could get if they revised or had the pandemic not happened.
- 4. There should be some form of external moderation this year to ensure all schools are submitting honest, accurate CAGs.
- 5. Exam boards should provide training and guidance to all schools to support teachers.

GCSE Exams 2021 - Ofqual Consultation

It is my responsibility as Headteacher to ensure that we uphold the highest of standards and integrity during this process. I will work with my senior team and curriculum leaders to ensure the evidence base we have, when submitting CAGs, is an accurate reflection of what the students have achieved. Ms Williams, SENCO, will ensure that those students with additional learning needs are not disadvantaged and that these students have the required support.

At the time of writing I do not know when school will reopen for face-to-face teaching, but I doubt it will be after half-term. I cannot therefore emphasise enough that students complete and submit all their work, respond to feedback and improve, where necessary. If students fully engage with work, then there should be very few surprises when GCSE results are awarded.

Do not expect a student to be awarded a grade 5 in Maths if their WAGs have been grade 3 all year, for example. WAGs can go up and down, depending on how students perform in their key assessments.

Do not expect a student to be awarded any grade if they have not done any work, completed any assessments during the autumn term, or failed to work during lockdown.

Do expect a student to be able to improve their WAGs and therefore increase their chances of attaining a higher GCSE grade. They can do this by responding to feedback, asking for extra work and tasks to provide evidence that they can produce work at a higher level, and asking their teachers.

Do expect the full support of teaching staff to offer advice and support so that students can improve.

BTECs

After initially giving schools the option to run the exams in February, the DfE have now cancelled them nationally. Unfortunately, we have received no further advice or guidance as to how we will be assessing and awarding grades. Please see below the update we have been sent: We want to reassure BTEC learners and centres that we will put arrangements in place for students who are now unable to take their external assessments to ensure they are not disadvantaged. So, those expecting to complete their qualification this year will be able to progress normally. By the end of this week, Ofqual will start to consult on arrangements for issuing grades this year for regulated Vocational and Technical Qualifications, as well as arrangements for external assessments due to take place in June.

While it is certain there will be no February exam we are still uncertain about what will replace it. As soon as we are made aware we will be sure to let students, parents and carers know.

The consultation closes on 29th January, after which Ofqual will publish the final details of how grades will be awarded.

Message from Cardinal Newman College, in case anyone hasn't seen it:

"A decision was made late yesterday afternoon to cancel our initial College interviews. Applicants and their parents were emailed immediately to inform them of this decision.

The initial interview and enrolment interview will be consolidated, so they will still have their enrolment interview in the summer once they have received their GCSE results. They will be able to use this opportunity to ask any questions that they have, discuss their future plans and make any changes they wish to their courses.

However, if any of your students do still want to have a chat with us they can of course get in touch and we will arrange a date and time for them to discuss any concerns that they may have. An email has been sent to both applicants and parents (where accurate contact details were available) and this will be followed up by a letter through the post. These contain details of how to go about getting in touch with us should they wish to.

All students who have applied have secured a conditional offer of a place, so please reassure them that their places with us are safe".

Please note that all college interviews will be via telephone or virtually on Teams this year - remember to check your emails regularly for your date/time. If you do miss an interview, just drop them an email and they will reschedule - or let me know and I will organise it for you. (Miss Berry) If you have not yet applied to college, please do so as soon as possible to enable staff to put together their interview schedules. Don't forget that you can change your choices at any time, up to and including the day you enrol at college. You should also accept **ALL** places that you are offered. For those set on an apprenticeship, you still need to have a full time course as a backup option.
