Dear parents and carers,

This week we held the Year 7 Respect day, which was delivered mostly by visitors from Daisy inclusive UK, a charity who work with disabled people and their families. After the day, the visitors sent us this lovely feedback about the day: "*Just to let you know what an amazing day we had at Parklands yesterday. The students were receptive and behaved impeccably while supported by your staff. The feedback from the students was great and I hoped we helped break down barriers towards a more inclusive society. We used sport as the medium in which to highlight the skills and determination that disabled people need to achieve their goals." Well done to all of Year 7!*

Year 11 pupils have had admissions interviews with Wigan and Leigh College this week, and today they are taking part in mock interviews with a range of local employers. Year 11 have created CVs and have been practising their interview skills for the day. They have been very nervous, but they have performed really well.

Next week is the final week in school before the half term break. It is also the final dress rehearsals ready for the annual Dance Show, which takes place in the first week back after the February half term break. Tickets are available to buy on Scopay now; we look forward to seeing lots of you there to support the children. It's always a really great show and I'm sure that this year will be no exception.

Attendance

Dear Parent / Carer

EXCESSIVE LEAVE IN TERM TIME - S444 EDUCATION ACT 1996

Lancashire County Council are currently reviewing the arrangements for pupils who are absent from school due to unauthorised leave/holidays.

Attendance at school is vital to help children thrive and achieve their best. Children who are absent from school can fail to meet their academic potential and those who fall below 90% attendance are at significant risk of underachieving.

Absence during term time must be avoided. If you are considering taking your child out of school for any reason, it is essential that you request permission for the absence.

When penalty notices are issued, parents have the opportunity to discharge liability for an offence under S444 of the Education Act instead of being prosecuted by the Local Authority. The penalty notice regulations determine the amount of the penalty notice fine. Unfortunately, some parents are choosing to remove their children from school for longer periods, as the fine amount is the same regardless of the number of school days missed.

From 01/01/2025, the following rules will apply:

- 1. Unauthorised leave less than 15 school days: penalty notice issued
- Unauthorised leave of 15 school days or more: the Local Authority will review any requests for penalty notices and may prosecute parents and <u>not</u> offer the opportunity to pay a penalty notice fine instead.

Failure to ensure your child's regular attendance at school is a criminal offence, and this means that if you are convicted, this could result in a fine of up to £2,500 and you will have a criminal record.

We have been asked by Lancashire County Council to issue this letter to parents to inform you that this procedure will now be applied to all excessive leave requests made to this school.

- Are there any historical accounts of Jesus from non-Christian sources?
- How do different Christian denominations interpret Jesus' teachings?

Year 9 – Islam

- What was the early life of Prophet Muhammad (pbuh) like?
- How did Prophet Muhammad (pbuh) spread the message of Islam?
- What challenges did Prophet Muhammad (pbuh) face when spreading Islam?

Extra Challenge: Students in Years 8 and 9 are encouraged to test their knowledge by answering questions from the earlier year groups!







What Parents & Educators Need to Know about SCAMS AND FAKE NEWS

"Fake news" refers to falsified or misleading material presented as a legitimate account of events. It's often used by malicious actors online to push an agenda, or even by criminals as a way of making scams more persuasive. Scammers can trick us into handing over personal information, security details and even our hard-earned cash.

"CLICKBAIT" PHISHING SCAMS

A message arrives saying "Have you seen this video of yourself?" or you might be sent an attention-greabing headine obout a celebrity that's been shared on social media. This kind of "balt" is produced by scammers to drive us to click on an unsafe link, where malware could be downlooded to our devices. These scams rely on our curiosity and our "need-to-know" instinct.

SALES, DEALS & DISCOUNTS

WHAT ARE

THE RISKS?

Some scams appear as adverts, offering a chance to buy something – such as designer products, expensive gadgets or tickets to a popular show – at a reduced price. Such plays often include a time limit or countdown, urging us to hurry so we don't miss out on the deal. This pressure encourages us to input personal details or payment information before pausing to check if it's legitimate.

YOU'RE A WINNER!

YOU'RE A WINNER! This kind of scam involves fake giveaways, opportunities or freebies. It could be a message saying we've won a prize draw or competition. or it could be a gift, free trial, bonus credit, and suchlike. It might claim that a package or refund is waiting. All these techniques are used to prompt us to share our personal information, thinking that there's something to be gained by doing so.

HAPPENS TEN

FALSE FRIENDSHIPS

Scammers often pretend to be someone they're not to gain their victims' trust. They might attempt to convince any children they connect with that they're a child of similar age with shared interests. Warning signs include a high volume of messages (often with an intense tone), secrecy, inappropriate levels of intimacy, guilt tripping, emotional manipulation, threats or blackmail.

PANIC MODE

To trigger a sense of panic, scammers may claim that a child's account has been hacked, or a virus has been installed on their device, or any number of other scary scenarios. They may claim to be able to fix the problem or offer a solution – if the child hands over control of the device or sensitive information. Similar scams involve impersonating a friend or relative, claiming that they're in trouble and need help.

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NEWS

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FAKE CELEBRITY ENDORSEMENTS

Impersonating influential people online is a common tactic for scammers, who can use technology to create fake photos, audio and even videos that look authentic. These can be used to convince us, for example, to buy products, sign up for so-called "business opportunities" or invest in cryptocurrency schemes - all of which are fake or otherwise malicious. Many scams also involve the impersonation of popular companies' social media accounts, as well as these of Individuals

STAY INFORMED

Stay up to date with the latest information and best practice on cyber-security. See what scam stories are reported in the news and make note of what tactics were used. Keep up with young people's digital lives: talk about what they're doing online and use properly endorsed resources to learn what risks certain sites and apps pose to their younger users.

ENCOURAGE HEALTHY SCEPTICISM

Most scams rely an emotional or psychological manipulation, tapping into our human institutios – whether that's to keep ourselves safe, help others, find answers, make friends, avoid losing out or to secure something we really want. Encourage children to recognise that pressure to act and to always consult with an adult – especially if what's on offer sounds too good to be true.

TALK TOGETHER

Children increasingly use digital devices for education, socialising, shopping and play. Don't wait for a problem to arise before you discuss the risk of scams, false information and fake news. Highlight what to look out for and clearly communicate under what circumstances the child ought to speak to an adult. Finally, ensure that they're aware of the support services that are available to them (such as Childline).

Chat often and openly with young people about fake news, online scams and how they both work. Encourage them to talk to you about anything they're unsure of or worried about online. If a child claims to have been scammed, don't possjudgeme Blaming the victim may deter young people from asking you for help. Remember: adults are scammed just as often, if not more.
