

Historical Fact of the Week On this day in **1871**...

STANLEY BEGINS SEARCH FOR LIVINGSTONE Henry Morton Stanley sets out from Zanzibar

Henry Morton Stanley was not born with that name. At first he was John Rowlands, born on 28th January 1841 in the workhouse in Denbigh, North Wales. His parents were not married. When he was eighteen, in 1859, he sailed to New Orleans. There he befriended a merchant, Henry Stanley, and eventually took his name. Stanley went on to serve on both sides in the American Civil War and then worked as a sailor and journalist.

In 1867, Stanley became a special correspondent for the *New York Herald* newspaper. Two years later he was commissioned by that newspaper to go to Africa and search for the Scottish missionary and explorer David Livingstone, of whom little had been heard since he had set off to search for the source of the Nile in 1866.


Stanley set out from Zanzibar on 21st March 1871 and led his caravan of nearly 2,000 men into the interior of Africa. Nearly eight months passed - during which time Stanley contracted dysentery, cerebral malaria and smallpox - before the expedition approached the village of Ujiji, on the shore of Lake Tanganyika.

Livingstone had reached Tanganyika in 1869 assisted by Arab slave traders although he only got to Ujiji in July 1871. When Stanley's caravan entered the village on 27th October, flying the American flag, villagers crowded toward the new arrivals. Spotting a white man with a grey beard in the crowd, Stanley stepped toward him and stretched out his hand with the words, "Dr. Livingstone, I presume?"

With new supplies from Stanley, Livingstone continued his efforts to find the source of the Nile. His health had been poor for many years and he died on 1st May 1873. His body was then taken back to England and he was buried in Westminster Abbey. Stanley became an MP in 1895, was knighted in 1899 and died at the age of 63 in 1904.

Established and supported by the Department for Education, the AET supports partnerships to improve educational access, experience and outcomes for autistic children and young people. Underpinned by current research into **good autism practice**, the AET programme is structured around the three education phases – **Early Years, Schools and Post 16**.

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
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
