- Accountancy, Banking, and Finance: International Financial Analyst, Foreign Exchange Trader, Bilingual Accountant, Financial Advisor for Multinational Clients
- Healthcare: Medical Interpreter, Multilingual Patient Advocate, International Health Consultant, Medical Researcher in Global Health
- Business, Consulting, and Marketing: International Business Consultant, Market Research Analyst, Bilingual Customer Service Manager, Global Brand Manager
- Leisure, Sport, and Tourism: Tour Guide, Travel Consultant, Sports Event Coordinator, Hospitality Manager
- Marketing, Advertising, and PR: Multilingual Content Creator, International PR Specialist, Global Marketing Manager, Advertising Account Executive
- Media and the Internet: Foreign Correspondent, Translator/Subtitler, Bilingual Journalist, Social Media Manager for International Markets
- Law Enforcement and Global Security: International Liaison Officer, Immigration Officer, Intelligence Analyst, Diplomatic Security Specialist

- Empathy: Better ability to empathize with people from diverse backgrounds.
- Analytical Skills: Enhanced ability to analyse and understand complex information.
- Career Opportunities: Access to a broader range of job opportunities in various sectors.

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#### 3. Subject Combinations and Education Pathways

#### At School:

Complementary Subjects: History, Geography, Art, Music, Business

#### Further Education in the North West of England:

Study a language at A-Level and then pursue degrees in French, Spanish or other languages. You can pair languages with Business Studies, International Relations, Tourism Management and linguistics. You may also consider a linguistics degree.

#### 4. Languages in the Real World

To see Languages in action:

- Attend career talks and fairs featuring linguists. Some of these will be organised in school by your teachers.
