Why Religious Education?

- **1.** Broad Understanding: It helps you understand various cultures, beliefs, and practices, which is valuable in our diverse world.
- **2.** Critical Skills: You'll develop critical thinking, communication, and ethical reasoning skills.
- **3. Personal Growth:** It encourages self-reflection and understanding of your own and others' identities and values.



## 1. Exploring Careers in Religious Education

Religious Education can lead to careers in various fields, including:

- Law: Understanding ethical and moral issues is crucial.
- Education: Teaching Religious Studies or related subjects.
- Journalism: Reporting on cultural and religious issues.
- Government and Politics: Working on policy related to cultural and religious diversity.
- · Non-Profit Sector: Working with charities and community organisations.
- Spiritual Leadership: Roles such as clergy or spiritual advisors



# 2. Skills Development in GCSE Religious Education

Studying GCSE Religious Education helps you develop:

- · Critical Thinking: Analysing complex issues from multiple perspectives.
- · Communication: Articulating ideas clearly and respectfully.
- Tolerance and Empathy: Understanding and respecting diverse viewpoints.
- · Decision Making: Making informed and ethical choices.
- · Collaboration: Working effectively with others.





# 3. Subject Combinations and Education Pathways

- At School: Pair RE with subjects like English, Economics or IT to prepare for specialised careers.
- Further Education: Study Philosophy and ethics at A-level, then pursue degrees in RE, Teaching, or Business.
- Apprenticeships in related fields like Teaching, Community health and wellbeing worker, Children, young people and families practitioner.
