Clay Relief – creating a relief piece inspired by the style of Giorgio de Chirico. Introduction to Printmaking Relief Printing – exploring simple shapes and patterns to create effective designs. Printing in the style of Brunelleschi – developing an understanding of print techniques influenced by perspective and architectural structures.
