

# **Low Stakes Tests**

# Have you heard your child refer to 'low stakes tests' and wondered what they are?

These are simply tests we do in the classroom that tell us what content, knowledge and skills have been absorbed, what has stuck and what may need reteaching. The idea of the test being 'low stakes' is essential, it's not a pass or fail assessment and avoids creating unnecessary anxiety and stress.

Low stakes testing is a great way of getting pupils to retrieve information and track whether pupils remember key aspects of the subject taught.



## Types of low stakes testing can include:

- Multiple choice guizzes
- Quick quizzes using
- Keyword definitions (both ways)
- Vocabulary tests/spelling tests
- Labelling a diagram from memory
- Recalling key facts/dates/people from memory
- Hinge questions (questions that show if pupils are really ready to move on or not)

Frequently we'll use good old paper and pen for these sorts of tests, or our mini wipeboards and board markers.

Sometimes we'll set these tests digitally and use apps and programmes such as Microsoft Forms, Quizizz.com and Plickers (https://get.plickers.com) all of which give teachers pretty instant feedback.

# How you can support learning in a similar way at home?

A steady diet of ten-minute guizzes throughout the week can have a significant effect on learning so if you can encourage your child to recall key facts of their lessons by retelling them to you, you'll be helping to embed their learning.

It's even better if you can ask your child to recall information from previous lessons - last month, last week, last lesson, etc. It has a really positive impact on their retention of learning.
