

GCSE Results Day: Their Stories

Rhianne celebrated a stunning seven Grade 9s and two Grade 8s as well as a Level 2 Star Distinction in Engineering – an extra course Priory fitted in for her.

"I did the engineering after school as I ran out of options I could take in school! I wanted to do everything!" said Rhianne.

"I want to be an astrophysicist so engineering is important. I want to go to the LUSoM (Lancaster University School of Maths) and study Maths, Further Maths, Physics and Chemistry. I am just so pleased with my results!"



Penworf Ella admitted she had done better than expected with her GCSE results.

She celebrated three Grade 9s, two Grade 8s and two Grade 6s.

"In my mocks I got Grade 5 in both my English subjects and I got Grade 6 on both so that may change my plans for the future.

"I also got three 9s in Science so I might do another science subject among my A-Levels along with Biology, Graphic Design and Maths at Runshaw College. I am thinking maybe an architect in the future, or perhaps something medical.

Autumn Update

Priory's gardens are our pride and joy and award-winning gardener Mr Farron wants to let parents and pupils know what to expect each month as the landscape changes.

Mr Farron has almost finished Phase 2 in the Priory Gardens and, now we are in Autumn, he is pleased with how it has taken shape.

"We have new signage and Phase 2 was all about the blank wall - creating shadows made by the trees and the roses, which we have planted this year.

"The Bay Trees will cast shadows on the wall, which will change during the day as the sun comes over. The roses are various kinds and are all gold Royal Horticultural Society winners. There are also lots of herbs in this garden."

Autumn leaves cascade & the season begins

Shrubs and small trees are the permanent features that give a garden its framework and less durable plants such as herbaceous perennials annuals and bi-annuals can be planted around them.

So, as the garden that produces such a wonderful display starts its well deserved rest, it is time to reward them with good maintenance and help them prepare for

the winter to come, making sure they are secure and protected. The fall of leaves provide an excellent source of compost that enable healthy growth for the new seasons ahead, collected and mixed with nettles and stored in black bags adding a little water will in spring provide a rich abundance of nutrients. This provides a high level of nitrogen - it smells revolting but its good stuff!



It is also time to replant trees and shrubs before first frost so get a move on and pack them well.

Here at Priory we do our upmost to provide a safe haven for all and that includes wildlife. I have mentioned in the past we have a family of wild rabbits, squirrels, moles and ducks and although they are not particularly good for gardens, they do provide entertainment from time to time They have recently been named as Cyril the Squirrel, Molly the Mole, Rupert The Rabbit, Robin the Robin and Doris the Duck, however each species keeps me on my toes.

I wish you all a really happy autumn and enjoy the splendour and colour this season brings. Keep digging!

Many pupils brought in cakes and a bake sale was organised by Mrs Scully which raised £70. This will be donated to the children's hospice, Derian House.












A Day At The 'Book' Fair!

Sonia Ward (nee Taylor) is now 82 and was invited back to Priory by Principal, Mr Eastham, to have a look around the school earlier this year.


The school opened in 1953 with Sonia among the first group of pupils to join and she became Head Girl

of Penwortham Secondary Modern School, as it was then, in 1955.

Her return story was featured in the newspapers and on the school website and she mentioned the Head Boy then - Roy Rich.

Roy saw the story and immediately contacted the school and the two met up again for the first time since they left Priory.

"I saw it in the newspaper and made contact with the



is the first time I have seen her."

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Sonia said: "It's amazing, as soon as I saw Roy I recognised him immediately. I haven't seen him since I was 16 but he still looks the same!"

Priory, which celebrates its 70th anniversary this next year, has changed a

lot with a new science laboratory building, a humanities building and IT block among other additions.

"My son Graham, who now teaches in Spain, attended Priory so my last visit would be with him when he left to go to Runshaw College." said Roy, 82, who finished his career as the Local Government Review Officer for Lancashire County Council.

"It was an honour to be Head Boy then, one of my jobs was to instil a little bit of discipline. Smoking was a big thing then so my job was to report it to the Head Master.

"Being back at Priory brings back a lot of memories, a lot of good memories. I remember upstairs

was a domestic area for boys and girls and I learnt shorthand and typing which stood me in good stead for my job at County Hall.

"I left school with four O'Levels, I was one of the first to take O'Levels. I had the chance to go to Hutton Sixth Form but I went straight into work at County Hall, that's what most people did then."

The duo looked at archive photographs of their time at Priory with the new Head Prefects, Fatima, Ben and Taylor.

"I remember we had to work hard in the gym, we had to climb the rope all the way to the top," laughed Sonia.

Fatima said: "It was amazing looking at the photographs. It's weird as some of it looks like a different school although some parts look the same with different decorations. It's great to be able to meet Sonia and Roy and follow in their footsteps."

One thing that hasn't changed is football – Roy was in the Priory football team and Taylor was happy to share football stories with Roy!

They gave Sonia and Roy a tour around the school and Taylor added: "It was a pleasure to meet them and hear their stories."

Year 9 Swimmer Reaches Top 10 in North West Rankings



Swimmer Charlotte is aiming to make a big splash - and has set her sights on the 2028 LA Olympics!

Year 9 Charlotte has been swimming for around four years and competes for Leyland Barracudas. She has represented Lancashire and the North West in 400m and 800m Freestyle for the Under 13 age group.

"I do prefer the longer distances," said Charlotte.

"I am dedicated, I train eight times a week and two days are very early mornings at Leyland Leisure Centre.

"I really enjoy it, I enjoy competing."

Charlotte, who is friends with former Priory pupil Libby who is on the GB training camp for synchronised swimming, is currently

ranked third fastest for this year in Lancashire for 800m and seventh for 400m. In the North West, she is ninth fastest so far this year over 800m.

"I competed in a North Lancs swimming meeting recently and came first in the 800m and fourth in the 400m.

"When I started swimming, it was just for myself but now I look up to the likes of Adam Peaty.

"It was great watching all the Olympic and European Championship swimming on TV over the summer and that has inspired me even more.

"I know it will take a lot of dedication but my aim is the 2028 LA Olympics, it's a big goal."


At the event, pupils could talk to the staff and current club members to see what they can do to enhance their personal development whilst having fun and making new friends.







Bobby admits his heart lies with football though!


"I am a Preston North End season ticket holder and my favourite player is Brad Potts.

grandparent, Mrs Lazonby, was amazing and with her expert sewing experience pupils made a good start on some practical skills of pattern cutting and


machine sewing."

Geography Pupils Have A Field Day at Wycoller Beck

Geography
Field Trip

During the last week of the half term, the Geography department took four groups of GCSE pupils out to Wycoller, near Colne.

Wycoller itself is a gorgeous village where the beck flows through, passing under the arches of the medieval pack

horse bridge and two ancient slab bridges. Once the home of Penelope Keith, now home to a small community who are devoted to the village.

Lead Teacher for Geography, Mr Watters, added, "After the short trip down the M65, Wycoller would be a great walk for families and / or dog walkers, the Bronte Way is an easy walk whether you fancy the 3.4 mile round trip or one of the more strenuous strolls. Note, there is a great little cafe in the village open most weekends!"

The four GCSE groups completed a number of fieldwork measurements, recordings and sampling procedures. Pupils studied the processes for the waterfall system and made their own videos explaining how the combination of fluvial processes erode the varying geology to cause the waterfalls to retreat.

After stopping at the first site, pupils recorded sampling methods that they used to test the discharge, velocity, width and varying bedload of the Wycoller Beck as it went downstream. The pupils will share their videos, photos and results for each to produce an analysis and series of graphs which illustrate how the streams correlate with Bradshaw's model.


History teacher Miss Ackers runs the Debate Club at Priory every Thursday and decided that her dedicated

Jemma Oliver



Former Priory pupil Jemma Oliver has travelled the world but is now giving back to the community of Penwortham.

Jemma left Priory in 1997 but returned for our Career's Fair last week where she talked about her work as a Physiotherapist.

Jemma, now 42, has worked internationally with elite teams, helping GB athletes in athletics, volleyball, bobsleigh and more and was involved in the London Olympics in 2012 as well as the Glasgow and Gold Coast Commonwealth Games with Team England. She has now set up a Physiotherapy practice in Penwortham, at Galloways in Howick.



"It was nice to return to Priory for the Career's Fair," said Jemma. "I stayed in touch with the Head, Mr Eastham, so I have been back a few times but not for six or seven years and it has changed a lot.

"I guess you would say I was a bit of a geek at school, I was a prefect and sports captain, and I threw myself into everything. I have fond memories of my time at Priory so it's nice to give something back."

Jemma admits that it wasn't always her dream to be a Physiotherapist: "When I was at school, I wanted to be a PE teacher. I went to college but was always more into science subjects, so I took that route. I did a Sports & Exercise Science degree at Leeds Met, then I went onto study Physiotherapy at Sheffield Hallam before doing a Masters in Sports Injury Management."

"I worked hard, and it was a dream to travel around the world and work in sport. I have got to say though it was also very tough at times and when you are a therapist, you can occasionally look after everyone else before yourself. This led to some anxiety and mental health issues which I now talk freely about to help others learn more about wellbeing and mental health."

"I came back to Penwortham from living in London to be near family and friends and base my new clinic where I grew up. I don't take a traditional 'physio clinic approach' as I believe it should be more about wellbeing and a chilled-out environment. I take my dog, I have pictures and plants, I want it to be as relaxing and non-clinical as possible."

"I want to use the skills I learnt travelling the world for the everyday person and the local community. My idea is to keep it simple, I treat pain, injuries, look at lifestyles and use what I have learnt about well-being to help the whole person."

Jemma also has an Associate Lecturer role at Manchester Met, writes a blog about mental health and encourages people to be open, as well as talking about her travels and of course her time at Priory on other stages.

"I jumped at the chance to come back to Priory and talk about my career and opportunities within my field. If you want to be a Physio you potentially need to have A-Levels but there are other pathways into working as a clinical therapist including Sports Therapy, Sports Rehab and Soft Tissue Massage work. A lot of children do not know about all the opportunities out there in this field, so it was great to engage with them."

"This is important to me, it affects so many people and many do not talk about it as you can be rejected by friends.

"I don't like talking about it but it's important to raise awareness and my sister helps me do that and she talks about it which is great because I love her!"



What is Dyspraxia?

Dyspraxia is a surprisingly common condition affecting movement and coordination in children and adults. It affects all areas of life, making it difficult for people to carry out activities that others take for granted.

Each person's experience of dyspraxia is different and will be affected by a person's age, the opportunities they have had to learn skills, environmental demands and the support/understanding shown by people around them.

There are, however, some common signs of dyspraxia affecting movement (difficulty coordinating large and small body movements), organisation and planning (organising themselves, their equipment and their thoughts), and speech and language (difficulty keeping up with conversations).







Mrs Kursitis' Year 8 classes have been creating earthquake proof buildings this week.


Pupils had to plan out their designs before making a start on their building. Once their design was drawn up, they were given a select amount of materials to work with including card, small boxes, paper straws and tape.

A large number of Year 7s have been granted warrior status by Head of English Mrs Gidden after completing 'The Legends of Kraznir' project.

Mrs Gidden's explained: "The Times Education Supplement ran this scheme around 30 years ago and I revamped it around ten years ago for the 21st Century, using one of my friends as an illustrator.

"We launch it on Taster Day and asked pupils to do it over summer and then, when they come into Priory, they continue working on it as part of their creative writing unit.

"In primary school, English tends to be quite technical so this was about creative writing and firing the imaginations of the pupils. It's pure fantasy!

"There are four staple characters in everyone's story but the pupils had to invent their lead character, decide which weapons they would have and which magical powers.



"It was centred around stopping the peaceful country of Slinsil being conquered by warlike Kraznir.

"The entries were absolutely superb and I have to give a special mention to Oliver K, who has a stunning way of writing and his imagery was amazing. We hope the Year 7s gain inspiration from it and take it all the way through school."

James added: "I like the fantasy genre a lot."






Artist Returns To Priory To Deliver Workshops


Conlons were given a board and drew 1953, the year of Queen Elizabeth's





The grounds around Priory continue to look treemendous thanks to our gardener Mr Farron and his helpful assistant Nathaniel.

Mr Farron was given a few hundred trees from the Woodland Trust. the

second time the school has had a donation.

He has been extremely busy designing and

planting tree saplings of various types kindly donated by the Trust – just over 100 trees including Silver Birch, Crab Apple, Rowen, Wild Cherry, Elder and Hazel, all mixed into two new small, wooded areas, east and west within the school grounds

"We want to create small woodlands," said Mr Farron. "We have started on the east side and planted 100 trees and then will plant the same on the west side. They are saplings and it will probably be around two years before we see a difference.

"The interesting thing is that in the areas we have been digging there is natural clay but there is also clay which was dumped from Preston Docks which is around 200 years old!"

Year 8 Nathaniel said: "We have been planting trees in the morning, around 8am, just before school. I enjoy helping Mr Farron and I have learnt a lot."

Mr Farron continued, "This most definitely will encourage wildlife, not forgetting staff and students as well. Here's looking forward to Spring!"

Advice for the Season

From a creative point of view, when winter-walking through established woodland, there will always be fallen branches that can be recovered and used as winter decorations once brushed down, dried and sprayed with silver or gold, then decorated. Try it, it's good fun!

Now is the time to tidy and prune, especially roses, making sure all leaves are collected and burned as blackspot has spoiled the appearance. Also spray with fungicide, based on Benomy-Buprimate / triforine, and then again in Spring.

There is still time to plant bulbs, preferably in pots, so go for a mixed selection and remember spring is the next one up.

Father Christmas knows well what to place within my stocking. I look forward each year to a fresh supply of exotic seeds and gardening books. These keep me busy in mid-winter with the colourful results to come.

So I would like to wish you all a happy nativitus. Keep blooming and smiling.

Jessica, who won a £15 Amazon voucher, said: "It's good to see it in print. It took me around a day to design it."


Year 9 Jane came second, winning a £10 Amazon voucher, with her snow globe design and this is on the back of the card.
